#### **WOMEN IN FRANCE** DISDAIN POLITICS

Prefer Old-Fashioned Home Duties and Pre-War Status.

PARIS, Oct. 28.—In studying the women of the countries of Europe, those of France are a great contrast to all others. Nearly everywhere else the war accomplished something in educating them to their political responsibilities. In France, however, the women seem to have unprotestingly returned to their pre-war condition. Only a small group is interested in the suffrage question, and there is no real effort being made to secure the franchise.

rule, is essentially feminine in her ac-tivities. However, there is a great amount of welfare work carried on by French women in an inconspicuous way. A large proportion of the hospitals, and many schools and relief organizations are run by women, who devote much of their lives to the work and of whom one never hears.

Do Not Seek Publicity.

In rural life she does an immense amount of heavy work, and in the fields she labors shoulder to shoulder with the man. In political matters the bulk of French women have a rather detached viewpoint. With their intense patriotism and family feeling, they take a vivid interest in anything that affects their beloved country or that affects their beloved country or their families, but they display little energy or interest in the political activities of women as a separate or

But things even as deeply rooted in But things even as deeply rooted in national life as the conservatism of French women have been shaken loose by the war, and in many directions since 1914 the women have ventured into new fields and evinced new interest in old ones. Many women have taken up with enthusiasm the ideas of social service demonstrated by the great cial service demonstrated by the great welfare organizations during the war, and are striving to epread their in-fluence among the French people.
