ABS HOLDS

SPEAKING about miracle men of sport, Johnny Dundee shouldn't be overlooked as the entry from the boxing world.

The other evening Dundee handed an artistic trimming to Joe Benjamin, the much-touted coast lightweight. Dundee was outwitted seven or eight pounds.

There has been Dundee's trouble all through his career; he has constantly been forced to give away weight in practically every match he has ever had.

Dundee has always been a legitimate lightweight. Seldom has he ever weighed over 120 pounds. In a number of his bouts he has come in at 126.

At times Dundee took on alleged lightweighters who were really closer to the waterweight limit. However, he never quibbled over the weight question.

There is another thing about Dundee that appeals to the boxing enthusiasts. He always gives them a run for their money. Any time Dundee is one of the principals it means the fans will get plenty of action. Dundee is that kind of a fighter. He forces it.

Dundee's toughest break was his failure to get a match with Freddie Welsh before Leonard got his chance at the title. Dundee would have surely beaten Welsh, who was ripe for the first good fighter who met him.

Had Dundee got his chance and won the title, he would have been able to place restrictions on contenders that would have made it pretty hard for some of them, Leonard in particular.

If Dundee had won the title he would have set the weight limit at 153 ringside. It is doubtful if Leonard would have ever taken a whiff at the title at that weight.

Dundee's career, a knockout by the hands of Willie James, however, in other bouts between the two, Dundee has proved his superiority, showing the knockout was in the nature of a fluke.

It is beginning to look as if Johnny Wilson would have to go to work. Lest you forget, Johnny Wilson is the technical middleweight champion of the world.

Since Wilson acquired the middleweight title he is having more trouble holding it than some of the crowned heads of Europe.

There are a great many experts who seriously question Wilson's right to the title. When he won the title from Mike O'Dowd on a technical decision, that failed to meet with popular approval.

Since acquiring the title on more or less of a fluke victory, Wilson has been the busiest prize fighter in the world holding onto his tarnished crown.

Only through the kindly offices of his traveling referee was Wilson saved in his bout with Bryan Downey at Cleveland last July.

Hundreds of sportsmen from all sections of the country are a unit in saying that Wilson was not merely knocked out once, but a couple of times.

The color of that fight still hangs over Cleveland. It put the boxing game in a bad. It has never quite recovered.

A ban on professional boxing exists at the present time.

Wilson's latest move that got him in bad was to get the \$50,000 that was being held up by the New Jersey boxing commission, because of his chess fight with Bryan Downey at the Jersey arena.

Wilson said he signed the contract because he was in a tight financial position. Not a great many more states permit of boxing.

At the present time about the only place where Mr. Wilson can box is in his own gymnasium, either with his sparring partner or by shadow boxing. It is said he much prefers shadow boxing.

Yes, it certainly looks as if Mr. Wilson would have to go to work. Nobody seems to care to see him box.

CONTROL IS BEST ASSET OF LEADING TWIRLERS

Famous Star of American League Says Most Pitchers Have Mistaken Idea of Control Though.

BY WALTER JOHNSON.
HAT is a pitcher's greatest asset? There is probably a considerable difference of opinion on that question. However, I am very frank to say that I have always regarded control as a pitcher's greatest asset. No matter how much stuff a pitcher may have, he doesn't get anywhere unless he can get the ball over the plate. In fact, his career in the big leagues I have seen hundreds of promising pitchers come up to the majors, only to be shunted back to the minors because they lacked control.

It doesn't make any difference how much speed a pitcher may have, or how fast his curve breaks, he is helpless unless he has control.

But the impression that control merely means getting the ball over the plate. That is only one form of control, although it is the most essential.

Control in a broad sense means keeping the ball where you want it. Of course there are times when the greatest of pitchers fail to make the ball obey their intent.

With a few pitchers control is a natural gift, with most pitchers it is an acquired art. Control can be attained by the wildest pitcher if he makes the proper effort in the correct direction.

Most pitchers make the mistake of warming up in a haphazard fashion. When I warm up before the start of the game I have a purpose back of each ball I throw. I work for control constantly, no matter what I am doing.
