

Gotham Pays Little Heed To Rumors of Players' Union Planning Strike

UNION ALLEGES OWNERS' RING

Judge Landis Would Be Objective of Attack.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—Reports that major league baseball players were organizing an association to present demands to the club owners and to call a strike next spring unless they were met were not taken seriously by Gotham magnates today.

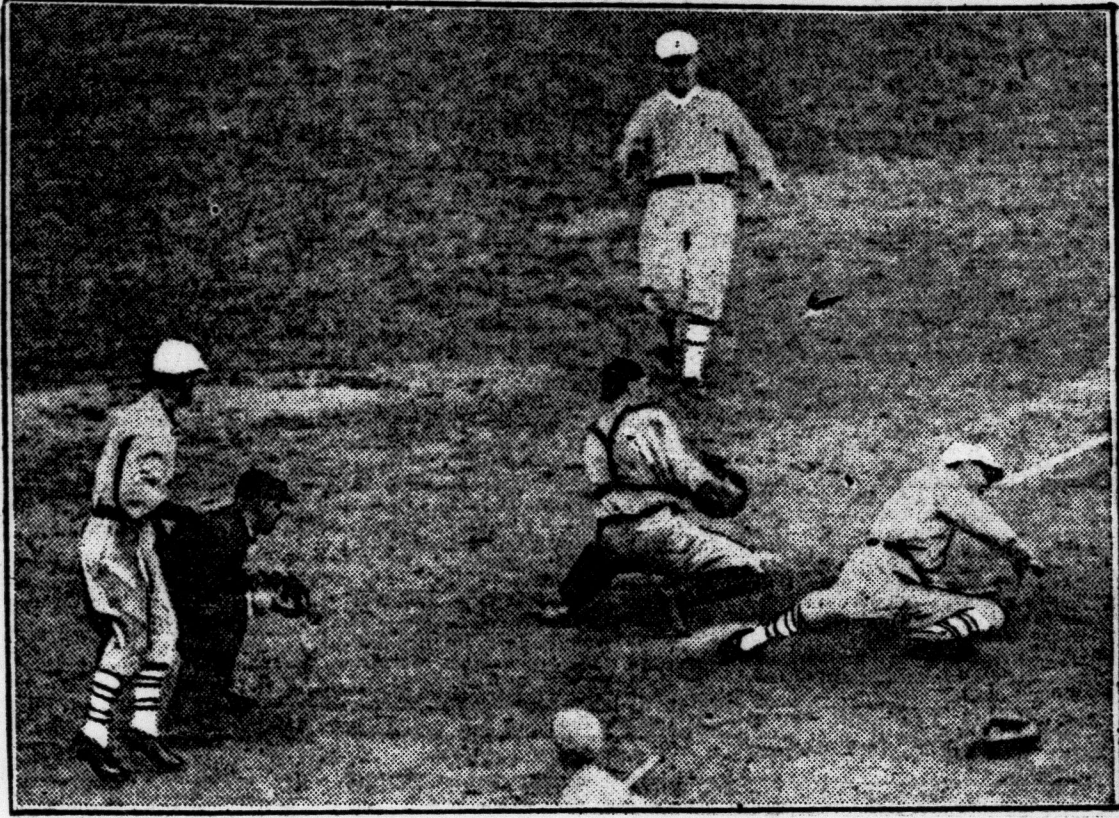
None denied the existence of a movement which has been under way about a year under the direction of Raymond J. Cannon, a lawyer of Chicago and Milwaukee, but all of them profess ignorance of the movement's present extent, its purpose and its membership.

There has been little secrecy about Cannon's work. From what can be learned, it appears that the movement is based on the dissatisfaction of many players with the manner in which Commissioner Landis has handled their affairs. It is said that the aims of the new association include representation on the advisory council, elimination of the "reserve" clause, and the establishment of a board of arbitration to hear players' grievances.

Specific cases upon which this dissatisfaction is supposed to be based are said to include those of Eddie Houchens, the Cincinnati star, who held out for a time for a salary of \$18,000; Babe Ruth and Bob Meusel of the Yankees; and Bill Piercy of the Boston Red Sox, who were suspended for barnstorming after the world's series.

The players identified with the movement are also said to nurse a belief that some ball players, who have accepted the displeasure of their employers, have been shunted out of the big leagues through secret agreements among the owners, each of whom is alleged to have agreed not to claim the ousted man, under the waiver rule.

Scott's Dramatic Come-Back Is One Human Touch of World's Series

AMONG the pitchers of the world's series Scott, of course, is the only one who pitched the only shut-out game of the series, and all the dramatic qualities are found in his feat.

The best anyone gave Scott before the series opened was a chance to relieve some veteran. The pitchers were to be Nehf, Barnes and McQuinn. Scott, Ryan and Jonnard were to do relief work in the order named.

When Scott was announced at the pitcher of the day McGraw was criticized. The selection appeared ridiculous.

Scott's case will be keenly discussed for some time. Boston had him and traded him to Cincinnati. He did not pitch for the Reds because he had a sore arm. Fitching was out of the question, and doctors said that Scott would never be able to work for a ball club again. The shoulder injury gave Scott so much pain that he could hardly raise his arm.

Cincinnati tried to send him to another big league club, but they did not want him. They tried to shut him out of the minors, but the minors turned him down. There was nothing to do but release Scott.

When the pitcher was notified of his unconditional release he also received word about the same time that a building where he had his tobacco crop stored had been burned, and he was completely out. He had no job, and he had no funds.

SCOTT managed to get enough money to come to New York. The story they tell has Scott walking along Broadway with 10 cents in his pocket.

Believes Gas in Air From Peat Bogs Responsible For Huge Northern Fire

NEW LISKEARD, Oct. 11.—A flight over the fire-stricken area, which has just been completed by Provincial Forester Zavitz and other provincial government officials, proves beyond a doubt that this was in no sense a forest fire, but a settler's fire.

"People who passed through the fire," said Mr. Zavitz, "all remark the fact that the air was on fire."

"When you consider the speed of the fire, the way towns caught fire as if from spontaneous combustion, rather than from contact with flame, it opens up a mysterious problem for the student of fires."

"These settlers' fires burning generally in peat bogs and in humus looking for Schneider that night with a pistol. He said he was at home and in bed when the murders were committed. His pistol, he added, was of .45 calibre, while that with which the slayings were committed was a .32.

Refugees from Northern Ontario arrived in the city tonight and applied to the welfare branch of the city health department for relief, making a total of 32 families who have done so since the disaster.

DELORME MUST STAY IN ASYLUM DECIDES JUDGE

Mr. Justice Daron of Quebec Rejects Petition For Writ.

INSISTS REGULAR WAY

Declares Alienists Must Rule That Former Priest Is Sane.

QUEBEC CITY, Oct. 11.—Mr. Justice Daron rejected Leopold Houle's petition for a writ of habeas corpus for Father Delorme this afternoon, maintaining the contention of the crown attorney that the petition was irregular, the proper course for obtaining Delorme's removal from the asylum to Bordeaux jail being for the medical authorities at the asylum to present to the lieutenant-governor a report showing that he was restored to a sound condition of mental health, and also that he had no authority to grant such a writ. This does not mean, however, that Delorme is awaiting further decision.

A decision of Mr. Justice Bruneau is awaiting there as to whether the courts of Montreal or those of Quebec City have jurisdiction over the case. If the court decided that Delorme's domicile is no longer in Montreal, but at Beaufort Asylum, this would still mean the transfer of the hearing to Quebec City.

In the event of Leopold Houle's opposition to the petition for interdiction being successful, this would imply that Delorme's insanity was not proved to the satisfaction of the civil courts and would not doubt give an opportunity to Houle for a further attempt to upset the order for Delorme's detention at Beaufort.

Will Continue Fight. It was stated today by a high legal authority that the only step open to Leopold Houle, in case of his petition for habeas corpus being rejected, would be to take a new petition for writ of habeas corpus before the court of King's bench, either at the November session in Montreal or at the December session in Quebec, unless he preferred to await the outcome of the interdiction proceedings now pending in the civil courts. Leopold Houle is paying a visit to his client at Beaufort this afternoon, and will then return to his home at Montreal. Asked what was the next step, he replied: "I have no new step for the moment. I am going back to Montreal at once. The Montreal proceedings are the most important matter for the moment now. One thing I can tell you, the fight is going on."

The decision was rendered by Justice Daron in chambers and behind closed doors, only counsel for Delorme and for the crown being present.

SEEKS NEW TRADE PACT WITH FRANCE

Hon. W. S. Fielding Expected To Return To Paris For Further Negotiations.

OTTAWA, Oct. 11.—(By Canadian Press.)—Negotiations with the French government, it is expected here, will shortly be resumed with a view to the conclusion of a new and possibly wider trade agreement between Canada and the French Republic.

Prior to proceeding to Geneva for the League of Nations assembly, Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance, conducted some preliminary negotiations with the French authorities, although, so far as available advice indicates he has not yet concluded the new agreement. He is now in London.

He will, however, in all probability return to Paris for further negotiations, conducted on the expressed understanding that not only will the negotiations for a treaty be successful, but that some present anomalies will be removed.

Of late Canadian trade with France has fallen off considerably in volume. The 12 months ending August, 1922, Canadian exports to France were \$10,500,000, while in the corresponding months of the year previous they were \$22,700,000. Imports from France did not decline nearly so heavily. In the 12 months ending August, 1922, they were \$12,500,000, in the 12 months ending August, 1921, \$14,700,000.
