Sessions Will Commence
Next Tuesday.

Ottawa, July 4.—Premier King told the House this afternoon that he hoped that the redistribution bill and supplementary estimates would be brought into the House on Monday. He also stated that morning sittings would start on Tuesday next.
Hon. Arthur Meighen asked if the government would have its whole program of legislation down on Monday. If not, morning sittings would be objectionable.
The prime minister replied that he thought all legislation with the exception possibly of that resulting from reports of committees would be down on Monday.

REPAIR WORK PROGRAM IS NOW WELL UNDER WAY

Better Lighting Arrangements
Urged In Some School
Buildings.

COMMITTEE MEETS

Planting of Trees in Front of
Schools May Be Done This
Year.

Preparations for the next term of the public school featured yesterday's session of the board of education's No. 2 committee. There was a complete attendance, and reports were heard on the progress of repairs to buildings as well as plans for new work. Iron grating for area spaces around Ealing school were recommended. Similar work had been done at Victoria school in South London, and that asked for at Ealing was said by Superintendent of Works Robinson to be highly necessary. New plumbing at Simcoe street and Wortley road schools was asked for, this work to cost about \$500.

Wiring and lighting fixtures are being recommended for Lorne avenue and St. George's schools. The work in these two schools is estimated to cost about \$2,000, that St. George's school being provided for in the estimates of the present year. "The lighting in these schools isn't the best," Inspector Greer said. "We are working on eight-saving classes now and the lighting in these schools should be improved."

Renovations are now complete at Riverview school, nearly complete at Tecumseh avenue, started at Lorne avenue, and about to get under way at Chesley avenue.

Attention of the committee to the proposals of the college committee in regard to collegiate accommodation in South London was made known. It was pointed out that the college wanted to use the library and one other room at Victoria public school. The library board was prepared to find new quarters if given sufficient notice, but the securing of one of the other rooms was to be a sacrifice to the public school pupils. Inspector Greer stated, Trustees expressed the opinion that the public school pupils should not be interrupted any more than possible. Trustee A. N. Udy moved that the request of the college committee be acceded to, and a suitable adjustment be made.

May Plant Trees.
Trees may be purchased for planting in front of public schools if the sanction of the board can be secured at its July session next week. Trustees present yesterday, as well as officials, expressed their willingness to provide for the purchase of one tree each.

Cheapside, Dakin and Price streets and Grand avenue properties have been surveyed, and will be advertised for sale either as blocks of property or in single lots. These lands are no longer thought necessary for school use. Purchase prices, with the exception of the Grand avenue property, was ascertained from the city treasurer's office. It is understood they will be sold by tender, with the board putting in a reserve bid.

The matter of liability insurance on schools was reported on by the secretary, who stated that the solicitor, T. G. Meredith, was preparing a written report on the responsibility of the board in connection with children attending school. It was pointed out by Inspector Greer that while the board had a disciplinary right over the children from the time they left home till their return, it was not sure about any legal liability the board had for their welfare. Trustee Mess asked that a report be made on the possibilities of the workmen's compensation act being put into effect in connection with school department workmen and school janitors. These matters will be handled by the special sub-committee on insurance.

AUSTRALIA REPORTED IN FAVORABLE POSITION

Melbourne, Australia, July 4.—In presenting his annual financial statement to the House of Representatives today, Hon. Dr. Earle Page, federal treasurer, expressed his satisfaction with the returns which disclosed that the commonwealth is in a favorable position, industrially and financially. The revenue for the year was \$46,014,000, and the expenditure totalled \$43,357,000, showing a surplus of \$2,657,000. These figures indicate a steady progress over the previous year, when the revenue was \$44,721,000 and the expenditure \$45,700,000, a surplus of \$1,021,000.

Snowballs Fly In Town Street On Summer Day

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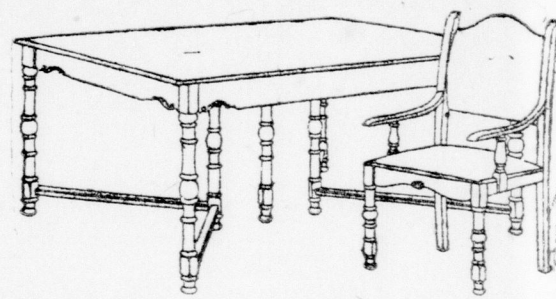
