CHURCH OF CHRIST SEEKS UNION OF IMMERSIONISTS

Toronto Pastor Declares Fusion With Baptists Is Desired.

ELECT A. E. TROUT

Convention Names Owen Sound Leader As New President For 1925.

The union of the Canadian churches of Christ Disciples and the Baptist church is but a moral obligation to the new fellowship wave now sweeping the country and which will reach its first crest on June 10, when the United church of Canada comes into being.

This declaration climaxed the address of Rev. George Quiggan of the Hillcrest church, Toronto, before the Saturday night session of the Ontario Disciples' convention. Mr. Quiggan's elaboration of "The attitude of the Disciples in Canada toward the Canadian church union movement," developed into the outstanding discourses of the convention.

He appealed to both congregations to bury their differences and the sincerity of the church union movement in Canada might be further established in the eyes of the world.

The most fruitful missionary caucus in the history of Disciples in Ontario was brought to a close last night in the Church of Christ Disciples, Elizabeth street. The sessions, spread over four days, were addressed by speakers of international repute and were attended by more than 300 visiting delegates, as well as London Disciples.

Union With Baptists.

"We are not compelled to adopt a purely negative attitude in this matter of Canadian church union," Mr. Quiggan asserted, after explaining how baptism principles had made the possibility of "while at present, our principles on baptism forbid us a corporate union with the United church they do not forbid us from seeking union with all Christians in Canada who preach believers' baptism by immersion."

"Of all these Christians, the Baptists are nearer to us in faith and practice. I appeal to both Baptists and Disciples of Christ in Canada to be big enough to forget petty prejudices and to make their contribution to church union in Canada by the union of these immersionist bodies."

"Nothing vital separates us. We have our fast and practice upon the New Testament teaching. Nothing but the name 'Baptist' separates us. I appeal to our Baptist denomination not to stake their identity upon a sectarian name. I appeal to the churches of Christ to forsake their prejudices. Do not be guilty of that unchristian statement, 'I have more in common with Presbyterians than Baptists.'"

"Questions of conscience divide us from our Presbyterian friends. No question of conscience divides us from the Baptists."

"Both communions owe it to this common Lord to realize a visible as well as an invisible unity, and to make this contribution to Canadian church union."

Labor Will Rule Sydney House

Associated Press Despatch. Sydney, Australia, June 6.—It is now definitely known that the Labor party is once more in power in New South Wales as a result of the general election of last Saturday. Earlier in the week there appeared to be some doubt as to this. The election returns showed that the Labor party holds 45 seats in the legislative assembly of New South Wales. The Nationalists hold 35 and the Progressives 2.

The government, headed by Sir George Fuller, leader of the Nationalist party, was a coalition of Nationalists and Progressives, and it followed the Labor government of J. Dooley. The last Labor administration was defeated at the polls in March 1924, by the combined Nationalists and Progressives.

More than 200 young people from every part of the province sat down at the young people's banquet on Saturday night. Mr. Matter and Rev. M. G. Boyce of Toronto were the speakers. At the session proper, Rev. John H. Wells, all-Canada evangelist, gave one of the most forceful addresses of the convention. His subject was, "The Duty of the Hour."

Mr. Hoover was the speaker of the Sunday morning service. J. D. Stephens gave the report of the afternoon committee at the afternoon session, while Dr. U. which took place at the communion service.

Mr. Quiggan preached at the evening session, which concluded the convention.
