CAILLAUX DECLARES

AGAINST CAPITAL LEVY

Announces As Policy System of Progressive Taxation Aimed At Opulence.

Associated Press Despatch.

Paris, Oct. 26.—Speaking before the electors of his own department of Sarthe, at Chateau du Loire, yesterday, M. Caillaux declared unequivocally against a capital levy, thus setting at rest countless rumors that he had bowed to the will of the Radicals and extremists of the Radical party, and that his financial program, which he will submit to his cabinet colleagues today at a critical meeting, would embody their wishes.

The finance minister sketched in broad lines his plans for financial rehabilitation, and incidentally intimated that he had decided it was necessary to resort to further inflation to meet the insistent and immediate demands on the treasury.

But he drew a distinction between "inflation" and his own proposal, which he termed "an operation consisting only in substituting Bank of France notes for bonds, which often pass as currency."

M. Caillaux proclaimed as his financial policy a system of progressive taxation striking severely at opulence, a "pillage" tax on luxury, "special contributions upon every form of fortune" at moderate rates, and a rigid system of public economies.

Dr. Erwin Bauer of Berlin has now proven definitely that cancer can only originate and grow when the surface tension of the tissue fluid is lowered.

Dr. Bauer has applied the theory successfully, and has discovered a means, called "Supertending," which when injected, raises the tension and produces reduction of the growths. The discovery is considered of great medical importance.

FIRST UNITED HOLDS 93RD ANNIVERSARY

Rev. R. B. Cochrane of Toronto Gives Vigorous Sermons at Both Services.

A vigorous denunciation of our modern social system featured the sermon of the Rev. R. B. Cochrane, M.A., D.D., of College street United church, Toronto, in his morning sermon at the First United church yesterday morning. It was the 93rd anniversary of the church and special music marked the services. In the evening the London male choir of 66 voices rendered the anthem. Special solos were also given by individual members of the choir.

"A church big enough for God," was the morning sermon topic, and the preacher attacked those who would bind the church to the traditions of the past. The United church welcomed into its fold all who believed in Jesus Christ, he declared. Subscription to a creed was non-existent.

A large part of the sermon was taken up with a study of the social problems which the church had to face.

"I don't believe that any person can say that our modern social system is Christian, when a few at the top have all the wealth and the rest have a struggle for existence," he declared.

"I don't believe our social system can be called Christian, when any afternoon I can visit a dozen families in a rooming house in Toronto, where children are not born into the world, but are damned into it; where mother and children suffer for want of food."

"I don't believe that it is the task of the church to build a new social order," the preacher declared.

The speaker related the story of the man who tried constantly to build a church which was big enough for his conception of God. As each structure was finished he was compelled to build a new one, as his vision of God was constantly becoming clearer.

"I didn't realize how true this was until I read where Jesus made his first visit to Nazareth after the commencement of His ministry. I found that in Nazareth there was a synagogue that wasn't big enough for the Son of God. 'He is crazy,' they all said, when Jesus laid claim to the Messiahship. They were not only indignant, but they cast him out of the city. Why? Simply because their idea of God wasn't big enough. They thought that if God wanted to bless the world, He would bless the Jews, and here was Jesus saying that God was the father of all men and the Saviour of humanity."

"As church men and women have come together in spiritual fellowship, they have grown, they have acquired bigger ideas of God, and so we must make our spiritual thought bigger. Any church and ever, church is just as big as the spiritual thought of its members concerning God. And so if we were to have a church that was big enough for our thought of God in the 20th century, we had to have a new church, and the United church came into being."

Mr. Cochrane declared.

"I submit to you that the United church is an honest attempt to build in the 20th century in Canada, a church that is big enough for God."

This has been a big season for the Railroaders, as they have cleaned up everything so far, and still have an excellent chance to win the provincial league.

Next Saturday they play Taylor-Forbes here, and should they win, will further enhance their chances. The kick-off is at 3 o'clock.

The game on Saturday was played under very bad conditions, and the conduct displayed on the part of several of the visiting players was, to say the least, very unsportsmanlike, and did not add in any way to their reputation.

The teams entered in the McCutcheon cup are the C. N. R. Thistles and Ontario Hospital.

That the City soccer league will be in operation next season seems almost assured, as several new clubs will be operating, and it is to be hoped that soccer will take a new lease of life.

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
