DELIBERATE MURDER. Coroner Pittendrigh's Son Discovered in the Bush Shot in the Suppositions as to its Cause and the Strange Circumstances

[Special to the Colonist.] New Westminster, Oct. 28.—The city is in a state of excitement over the murder

of A. E. Pittendrigh, son of Captain George Pittendrigh, late H. M. Third Buffs, who was found last night, at 9 o'clock, shot in the back of the head. The murdered man was a great favorite here, and the motive for the murder is shrouded in the deepest mystery. The principal facts of the mysterious affair are as follows: Last evening. while patrolling Front street beat, Constable Douglas was informed by a Siwash that Indians were drinking on the pleasure grounds on the river front and quarrelling. The constable found everything quiet there, but while passing from one tent to another, heard a meaning sound from the bushes a little distance further up the hill. Making his way up the tortuous path from Front to Columbia street and burning matches to light his way, Douglas came across the prostrate form of a man lying a couple of feet out of the trail. Thinking the person was an intoxicated Indian the policeman took hold of him, saying, "Get up you drunken Siwash!" "I'm not drunk, I'm shot, my head! my head!" came from the lips of the dying man, and those were the last words he uttered. The constable placed the wounded man on his back and carried him to the lock-up, where Pittendrigh's identity was discovered. Doctors Fagan and Walker were summoned, and examination showed that Pittendrigh had been shot in the back of the head, the bullet entering the skull and lodging in his brain. The dying man was so covered with blood and dirt as to be almost unrecognizable. The doctors ordered his removal to St. Mary's hospital, where it was found that the wound must prove fatal and, owing to its dangerous location, the doctors did not consider it safe to probe to any depth. Captain Pittendrigh was summoned, and remained with his son until death occurred, shortly before I c'clock this morning. Meantime the city and provincial police scoured the neighborhood for the assassin. The entire night was spent in the search. Peter, an Indian, found sleeping in a tent within 30 feet from where the murder had been committed, was arrested by Chief Huston. Peter appeared to be drunk when roused but soon straightened up, and walked all right and evidently had shammed drunk.
