LOSS OF THE PEERLESS.

Some further particulars of the loss of the schooner Peerless, Captain Llewellyn, have been received. The schooner sprang a leak during the gale of September 30 last off St. George's Bank. The vessel was awash and the crew were constantly at the pumps until the morning of October 3, when she was abandoned. The crew of seven all told, took to the boats, and in about an hour afterwards the Peerless sank. After rowing for forty hours the crew landed at John's Island and on Saturday the men were taken to Wood's Harbor in a gasoline boat. From there they went to Yarmouth, reaching the latter place on Saturday last. The crew were paid off at Yarmouth. Captain Llewellyn, who described the storm the worst he had ever witnessed on the coast, will come to St. John. The Peerless was bound from Perth Amboy to St. John with a cargo of hard coal for Mr. C. E. Cowell.
