TORONTO, March 7.—Cats Head—No. 2 fall wheat offered at 81 3/4 May delivery with 81 1/2 bid, and No 2 spring at 81 1/2 cash, without 81 1/2. A car of No 2 choice barley sold at 81c, and No 3 extra offered at 77c without bid. A car of rye was wanted at 80c.
The street market this morning was again very quiet, with receipts of all kinds of produce light. One lot of wheat sold at 81 1/2, and two loads of barley at 80c and 80c per bushel. Peas, oats and rye nominal. Clover seed quiet and easy at 84 to 85 per bushel, according to quality. Hay was in fair demand and firm, with receipts of about forty loads; clover sold at 80 to 81, and timothy at 81 to 81 1/2 a ton. Straw steady with sales of half a

dozen loads at 87 to 89 7/8 a ton for bundled and 85 for loose. Eggs steady at 15c to 16c, and butter firm at 42c to 45c for choice rolls.
