A First-Class Dairy System To those who champion the cause of public health a visit to Mr. Bryce's hygienic dairy in Yonge-street, in the town of North Toronto, will be a source of satisfaction. Mr. Bryce, having taken over the lease of the old Sparrow farm from G. C. Moore, proceeded to make extensive alterations and improvements thereon. Some idea of the radical alterations effected may be learned from the fact that the main stable has a length of 200 feet by 80 feet in width. The interior of this large building is thoroughly whitewashed and, with its 12 ventilators, presents a bright and cheerful aspect. Everything is in spick-span order; no poxious smells to assail the nostrils, but the fragrant breath of the immates appears to seent the air. The floor of the main stable is divided into two rows, in which order the animals are fastened, with heads facing each other, and kept in position by means of stanchions. The droppings of the animals fall into depressed troughs covered with what is known as the Stewart grating and by this means are quickly carted from the building. Food is supplied by means of a truck running on rails between the two rows of animals, that machine being constantly replenished by means of clutes reaching from the lofts above. This food consists, of clover, hay, wheat, bran, peameal and oil cake. Pistillery refuse is utterly discarded, as though a great milk producer it greatly lacks in quality, and for this reason Mr. Bryce does not make use of it.

From this fact one may perceive that a day's "feed" is one of the most interesting items in the bill of cost, the animals consuming two tons of food per day. The stables are disinfected every day and kept in a dry condition by means of powdered plaster of paris. In fact everywhere the visitor turns he cannot help being impressed by the vigilant and careful attention paid to health and cleanliness. Another department in which Mr. Bryce appears to be a plonger throughout the city is known as the bottling and wash house. This building is 30 feet by 50 and adjoins the main stable. It is kept carefully ventilated, a fresh current of air continually passing through it, and it is to this department that the milk is brought in order to be bottled. In the first place the milk passes through what its known as "the aerator" and is strained no less than seven times; secondly, it is passed through "coolers" specially constructed for Mr. Bryce, and having undergone this ordeal is ready for bottling.

It is by contrivances such as these and the determination to maintain cleanliness as a primary rule that this enterprising dairy has prospered, the daily "turn-out" of bettled milk being little less than 1000 bottles. Of course, there are expenses incidental to this establishment which other dairies do not incur on account of their want of system and hygienic discipline, but people are beginning to understand that cheapness is not the only requisite to insure custom, but that hygiene, with its recent giant strides, demands also the health and good treatment of cattle. Having just complete a afterations and extensions to our stables, by which we have room for 150 cows, we are now prepared to supply all demands for Aerated Milk, Cram and Butter.
