LADDS WON THE DERBY.

Premier Rosebery's Unbeaten Colt, at Odds of 9 to 2 On, Lands Engagements of the Derby.

LONDON, June 6.—England's Derby was run today at Epsom Downs and won by Premier Rosebery's Lada. Lord Alington's Matchbox finished second and Mr. T. Cannon's Reminder third.

The day opened cold and damp, with a strong easterly wind, making the weather extremely disagreeable. The betting in London this afternoon was 1000 to 300 on Lada.

In spite of the refusal of the House of Commons to observe precedent and adjourn over Derby Day, the attendance in the House was so sparse at the opening of the sitting that many persons were constrained to ask who it was that voted against adjournment.

Several of the ministerial leaders were consistently present, but of the Conservatives in the front bench Mr. Balfour and Mr. Henry Matthews sat alone. It is estimated that over 100,000 people were in attendance.

Shortly after the race the rain fell in a downpour, drenching thousands of those on their way home.

Time 2:45.46. The race—The horses reached the post at 3:16 p.m. and were off at 3:18. Lada was the quickest in getting away and soon steered down.

Matchbox, a slow pace, led Hornbeam and Bullington, with Reminder and Clyd in front of Lada and Galloping Dick.

Under the whip at the quarter Matchbox had a slight lead over Bullington, Reminder and Hornbeam, followed by Lada, who was a clear length ahead of Clyd.

Passing the mile post, still somewhat slow pace, Bullington joined Matchbox, followed by Hornbeam and Lada, with Reminder next and Clyd last.

Entering the straight Bullington led his place and Hornbeam drew into second and Bullington came next in front of Reminder, but at the stretch Lada was second, joining Matchbox opposite the stand, soon drew in front and was by a length and a half. Hornbeam was fourth, Clyd fifth and Galloping Dick last.

After the race Lord Rosebery himself led Lada back to the enclosure surrounded by thousands of persons cheering like mad. The police were obliged to make a cordon round the Premier and his victorious 3-year-old. The Prince of Wales personally congratulated Lord Rosebery on his triumph.

He commenced his career by winning the Woodstock Stakes at Epsom Summer Meeting, in which he beat Misca, Glare and three others, defeated Bullington, Vulpes, Arcton and six others for the Coventry Stakes at Ascot, beat Sempronius for the Champagne Stakes at Doncaster and finished up an easy victor for the Middle Park Plate at Newmarket Second October Meeting over Joaze, Sempronius and four others. The Derby has twice only resulted in a dead heat. In 1828 the Colonel and Lada could not be divided, but the latter won the decision in 1884 St. Gatien and the latter ran a dead heat and the stakes were divided. Mr. Hammond, who owned the latter, was at one time employed in the Harvester, at G. a week.

favor of prohibition as far as the law allows and no more.

Next Mr. Lindsey maintained that the policy of sub-division of offices, which was urged against Sir Oliver, was not his policy at all but that of the Conservative party.

The New Government had only divided one office, whereas the Conservatives had cut up a dozen offices.

The registry office sub-division and arrangements Mr. Lindsey justified, maintaining that instead of taking money out of the ratepayers' pockets the Toronto registry office had been the means of putting into the municipal coffers \$140,000.

On the separate school question Mr. Lindsey said they existed as a matter of constitutional contract, and that without this contract Confederation could not have been had.

The Derby has been run annually since 1780, inclusive. The only first prize winner of England, besides Lord Rosebery, who ever won the Derby was the Duke of Grafton and his Grace carried off the stakes in 1822, 1820 and 1810. Lord Egremont won the Derby five times and the Oaks the same number, but never both in the same year.

(Cheers) Look how this kaleidoscope changes its hue! (Laughter.) A great part of the rest of the Minister's speech was an analysis of Mr. Meredith's political career.

"Who will answer his political identity?" Mr. Ross then maintained that Mr. Meredith would shake hands with anybody if peradventure it might give him possession of the Treasury bench.

Then Mr. Ross launched out into a defence of his action as Minister of Education. If justice was not to be done to the 7 per cent. of school population in the Separate schools, as well as to the 93 per cent. in the Public schools, he did not want to be Minister of Education any longer.

The constitution presented the carrying out of Mr. Meredith's program—that there would be the same class of teachers and the same text books. The constitution also would not allow of one class of schools for both Protestants and Roman Catholics.

Mr. Meredith and his allies are responsible for that bitter sectarian strife which prevails in Canada to-day. He has not only educated the public, but he has also educated the clergy.

Turning to Dr. Ryerson, Mr. Ross said: "I never saw in any Legislature man with so much assurance and so small capacity as Dr. Ryerson." (Loud laughter.)

At length the Minister denied political or religious partisanship in the administration of his department. He defended charging the expenses of his trip to England to the public, and said that opponents condemned in Ontario what they condoned at Ottawa.
