EDITOR GUIDE-ADVOCATE: --Last spring I suggested to our Public Library Board the desirability of trying to get a grant from the Carnegie Cor-poration of New York to enable us to erect a suitable building here for our library and reading room in order to have proper accommodation and to be up-to-date with other towns. On behalf of the Library Board I was asked to do what I could in order to get a grant of of the Library Board I was asked to do what I could in order to get a grant of \$6000 for the purpose mentioned. We had failed to get it in the past. At first our request was not entertained but later on I succeeded in getting an agreement from said Carnegie Corporation to give us this amount on condition that we provide a suitable site for the building and maintain a free public library at a cost of not less than \$600 each year. A good many people do not seem to

A good many people do not seem to understand this proposition. Some think that we will have to pay \$600 more than we are paying now. Others think that we will have to be solve the more than we are paying now. Others imagine we forfeit the government grant. Others have an idea we must pay \$600 over and above the books, magazines and newspapers we buy. Now all of these opinions are wrong. It will not cost our ratepayers for maintenance of our library one cent more in taxes than it SON

our ratepayers for maintenance of our library one cent more in taxes than it does now by taking advantage of the Carnegie offer above referred to. If any person doubts this I am prepared to prove it.
