

Danger From Potato Canker

Janger From Fotato Canker Mr. H. T. Gussow, Dominion Botanist, Central Experimental Farm, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, has issued the following circular:--Pot to canker should not be allowed to gain ; a foothold in Canada. It is a dis-ease which makes slow progress, but where once broken out it has defied every known means of control. With the approach of the potato harvest all grocers are, particularly requested to examine their potatoes for signs of canker. A case of potato canker escaping detection forms a source of fulure infection. The appearance of this disease has been well illustrated by the Farmers' circular No. 3, obtainable free of charge from the publication branch of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa. tion (crude carbolic acid, sheep dips, etc.) before removing them from such infected land. Any soil left adhering to them or to the boots of persons work-ing in the field. is liable to contain dis-ease germs, and in this way may be re-sponsible for carrying the disease to clean land. In conclusion I must caution you to carefully carry out all these instructions. They have been devised to protect your own and the country's interests. Also kindly note paragraph "3" of "The De-structive Insect and Pest Act," reading : (3) "Every person who contravenes
