The Canada Pacific Railway.

IN CANADA ON AMERICA TO OWN THE ROAD.

With a railway from ocean to ocean, penetrating the heart of this "100,000,000 acres of good wheat land," the population of it ought to be more than 3,000,000 long a time as thirty years ago. We will want that Dakota, Montana, and Washington, with less than 30,000,000 acres of good wheat land, will contain twice the number of people in less than three decades after the completion of the Northern Pacific from Lake Superior to Puget Sound. Yet it will not be evenly laid if the whole Dominion shall duplicate its inhabitants in the time named. If, indeed, there shall be a Dominion at that date, we do not err it will cost more than the construction of the contemplated railway to keep Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and British Columbia out of the United States for even twenty years. They all lean more naturally upon this country than the Dominion. Manitoba and British Columbia will find our railway and shipping lines more profitable than any other can ever be; and they will seek them for their own sake, and not for the sake of the Dominion. The proposed Dominion Railway will be a benefit to both countries, and we hope Sir Leonard Tilley may find the capital he is eventually bidding for to construct it. He and the company whose interest he respects in this statement are probably the nation from whence the Dominion Railway derived the startling information recently set forth at an agricultural fair in Berkshire, to the effect that the best parts of the great farming States and Territories of the United States are becoming depopulated by emigration to this new and vast region of the Dominion. The statement is remarkable for its ignorance of American geography, topography, and current events, has not yet considered that it was imposed upon Beaconsfield by agents and solicitors for the Dominion Railway Company, who first beat the London bazaar for capital before the strict New York and who would like to secure some guarantee from the British Government itself.

EUROPE.

London, Nov. 2.—The Echo this evening publishes a statement that a fresh outbreak of kindred in the Western States of America will prevent the resending of the order against the importation of live American cattle. A special London despatch says it is now probable Parliament will be dissolved in December, in which case the success of Gladstone in Millthorpe will be more than doubtful. It is rumored in well informed circles that Russia is preparing to declare war against England. There are signs of a real revival of British trade, but there will certainly be a great deficiency in the revenues. Gladstone is preparing a speech attacking the financial policy of the Government. News, Oct. 31.—Small streams of lava flowed from Vestavist yesterday.

UNITED STATES.

Chicago, Nov. 1.—Senator Zach. Chandler, of Michigan, was found dead in his bed, at the Grand Pacific Hotel, this morning. He spoke last night with unusual earnestness to an immense audience, but later in the evening complained of indigestion. Washington, Oct. 31.—At a cabinet meeting to-day the Secretary of the Treasury called attention to the fact that Canada has prohibited the importation of American cattle on account of apprehensions of pleuro-pneumonia, and as the same fear exists among Americans in regard to Canadian cattle, it was agreed that an order shall be immediately issued prohibiting the introduction of Canadian cattle to this country.

San Francisco, Nov. 1.—The Grand jury found a true bill of assault, with the intent to murder, against Charles DeYoung for the assault on Kalkoff. Cayuga, N. Y., Nov. 3.—Courtney has sent a despatch to William Blake to-night accepting his last suggestion to row Hanlon for the \$6,000, agreeing to put \$500 for it.

CANADA.

Ottawa, Nov. 1.—The Minister of Militia has authorized the publication of a regulation and orders for the militia of Canada for 1879, which will supersede the regulations and orders of 1878. This consolidated work embraces sections of the law relating to the militia and defence of Canada, the portion now in force of regulations and orders for the Militia, 1870, and extracts from the Queen's regulations. One copy will be sent to each officer of the district staff, and a copy to every field officer, Captain and adjutant of the Active Militia. Windsor, Nov. 3.—The ice bridge has formed on the river, and people are crossing on foot to-day. The weather is clear and cold. London, Ont., Nov. 3.—A malignant and fatal disease is reported from London township, called black tongue. It is very similar to those of diphtheria. Five children of Mr. Richard Weatherall, of the fifth concession of London, have died from this disease and others are now down, but may recover.

London, Oct. 28.—The News believes that Parliament will be dissolved before the end of the year, owing to the registration showing a Liberal preponderance. This will deprive the Liberals of any good effect of reorganization, as it does not take effect until 1880. There will be several Cabinet Councils next week. Sydney, Oct. 29.—Dr. Charles Clarke, homoeopathic, administered a dose of ether yesterday to Mrs. Newton Ellis, twenty-five years of age, in this place, to extract a tooth. She became insensible and never recovered. The editor of the Sportsman has sent Hanlan by mail a formal demand for the return of the challenge cup. Meaning the trustees have been invited to consider Elliott's proposal to include the cup in his race with Boydell. Intention has been received from St. Petersburg that a division of troops, numbering 40,000 men, has been ordered from the Caucasus to Central Asia. Several officers of the general staff have also been ordered to Central Asia. New York, Oct. 29.—A stow-away found on the steamer England from Liverpool died a few minutes after discovery. He had been without food or water for thirteen days. Boston, Oct. 30.—The village of Parker, Penn., was almost wholly destroyed by fire to-day. Loss \$30,000. The billside and river shores are lined with homeless families and homeless children. Great excitement prevails. The Gazette publishes a proclamation again proroguing Parliament until the 19th of December. The In Ozeanville, yesterday, fell 25 per cent. The Amer has finally placed his abdication in the hands of Gen. Roberts. It will probably be accepted. London, Oct. 30.—A meeting of the corporation of Dublin to-day passed resolutions asking the Government to alleviate the distress in Ireland, and praying for the establishment of a peasant proprietary. Copies of the resolution will be forwarded to Beaconsfield. London, Oct. 30.—The trial of the Amer's ministers is about to begin. There is said to be convincing proof of their complicity in the massacre of the British Embassy. The loss by the hurricane of last week is P. E. Island is estimated at \$80,000.

Disappointed Yorkshiremen.

David Mewha, one of the colony of Yorkshire farmers that emigrated into Texas a few weeks ago returned to New York yesterday with his wife and four children. He gives a sad account of the emigrants and says that most of them are moving Dr. outward. Only twelve families are left in the neighborhood of New Philadelphia and San Antonio. The 100 acres of land which were offered him at \$3 per acre by a "bull" prairie totally unfit for agricultural purposes. Mewha says that all the emigrants blame the Manager of the European Land and emigration Department of the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railroad of Texas in London. It was upon his representation that they emigrated. They found out that all the available land is held at \$20 per acre and that owners will not sell in lots of less than 800 acres. All the emigrants are provided with money enough to buy land in Texas, and Mewha will stay and look about him for a farm.—N. Y. Paper.
