They further recommend the publication of a self-paying souvenir number of THE TRINITY UNIVERSITY REVIEW, about May 1, 1901, and that the Jubilee proceedings should be chronicled in the next issue of the Year Book.


3. FEDERATION.-Your Committee devoted some considerable time to the frank discussion of the question of Federation, more especially with regard to its bearing upon the Medical College, and the whole matter is now in the hands of a Committee of Corporation duly empowered to take full and definite action. In view of the present satisfactory progress of the movement your Committee does not consider it necessary to express anything more definite than a hope that such a decision may be arrived at as shall best promote the objects for which Trinity exists, and enable her to serve well the Church and the country.

4. EXTENSION LECTURES. - During the past year forty lectures were given in twenty-three different towns, the average attendance being about 180. The report of the Rev. W. H. White, embodying certain proposals for the improvement of the scheme will be submitted to the Annual Meeting.

Your Committee is pleased to be able to state that Mr. C. W. Bell has kindly consented to act as Secretary during the coming season and that Professor Montgomery will assist him.

5. YEAR BOOK .- Your Committee desires once again to place on record its appreciation of Prof. Mackenzie's excellent work in connection with the Year Rook which has been supplied to every member of Convocation upon receipt of his Convocation fee.

6. CHANGES IN THE PERSONNEL OF THE COMMITTEE. -Your Committee regrets that during the year three very active members have retired from its ranks, the Rev. Canon Welch, who ceased to be an ex-officio member when



he resigned the office of Provost; the Rev. W. H. White who has rendered most valuable services in connection with the Extension Lectures, and is at present living in E land, and the Rev. C. H. Shortt who has gone to swell ranks of Trinity's contingent to the Foreign Mission Fig. On the other hand they have had the pleasure of welcoming, in the person of the Rev. T. C. S. Macklem, a worth successor of our late Provost, and have already proved value of his counsels in meetings of the Committee. ference must also be made to the removal from Trinity the Rev.
