



EXCHANGE OF NOTES (April 27, 1951) BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNION OF SOUTH AFRICA AGREEING TO THE TEMPORARY SUSPENSION OF THE PREFERENTIAL RATE OF DUTY ON WOOL NOT FURTHER ADVANCED THAN SCOURED FOR A PERIOD OF ONE YEAR ENDING NOT LATER THAN 31 MARCH 1952

YOUR EXCELLENCY,

I have the honour to refer to your letter of the 5th March, 1951, in regard to your Government's desire that the Government of the Union of South Africa should agree to the temporary suspension for a period of one year ending not later than 31st March, 1952, of the margin of preference of ten cents per pound weight on wool, not further advanced than scoured, which is guaranteed to the Union by virtue of the Trade Agreement concluded between the Union and Canadian Governments at Ottawa on the 20th August, 1932*.

I now have the honour to inform you that the Union Government agree to the temporary suspension of the margin of preference of ten cents per pound weight on wool, not further advanced than scoured, during the period from 1st April, 1951, to 31st March, 1952, inclusive.

I suggest that this Note and your confirmatory reply thereto in similar terms be regarded as constituting an agreement between our two Governments on this matter, which will have effect as from the 1st April, 1951.
