Mr. Guthrie, a Member of the King's Privy Council, laid before the House, —Copies of Orders in Council, P.C. 1822, dated 16th August, 1932, and P.C. 1848, dated 19th August, 1932, relating to the removal from office of His Honour L. H. Martell, County Court Judge for District No. 4 in the Province of Nova Scotia; also report and evidence concerning the same.

Mr. Sauvé, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to Order of the House of the 19th October, 1932, for a statement showing the postmasters who have been dismissed in the county of Bonaventure since the first of August, 1930, the names of the post offices and the reasons of such dismissals, as well as a statement of the post offices which have been closed and the reasons therefor, also the new post offices that have been opened and on whose recommendation.

And also,—Return to an Order of the House of the 27th October, 1932, for a copy of all correspondence, letters, telegrams, petitions and other documents exchanged from January, 1931, to date, between the Post Office Department or any official thereof and all persons, corporations, or others in connection with the dismissal of mail carrier Joseph Paradis, at St. Germain, county of Kamouraska.

The Bill No. 3, An Act respecting a certain Trade Agreement between the Dominion of Canada and the Union of South Africa, was again considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with an amendment, considered as amended, and ordered for third reading at the next sitting of the House.

The Order being read for the second reading of Bill No. 8, An Act respecting a certain Trade Agreement between His Majesty's Government in Canada and His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom;

Mr. Bennett moved,—That the said Bill be now read the second time:

And a Debate arising thereon, and continuing; the said Debate was, on motion of Mr. Motherwell, adjourned.

At eleven o'clock, p.m., Mr. Speaker adjourned the House without question put, pursuant to Standing Order 7, until to-morrow, at three o'clock, p.m.
