Mr. Hees: Mr. Speaker, I am glad to be able to restore calm to the chamber.

Some hon. Members: Oh, oh!

Mr. Speaker: Order, please. The hon. member for York South is rising on a question of privilege.

Mr. Lewis: Mr. Speaker, I am sorry to take up time this way, but, as a member of the House I do not for one moment intend to sit back and take that kind of remark.

Some hon. Members: Oh. oh!

Mr. Lewis: The accusation of unfairness was unwarranted. I am concerned about the matter because the closing will take place on March 5. If the minister cannot do anything about it let him admit it instead of saying these things.
