will be greatly encouraged. We shall also have organized groups of our upper middle class forming concerted settlements in Canada, securing, thereby, a transfer of friendly associations to new scenes and amidst conditions of prosperity. Emigration thus conducted will carry the joys of home into a country in which that happiness will be brightened and rendered more permanent. For the attainment of these objects I shall continue to labour, and if I can, in any way, assist either capitalists or workmen into more prosperons conditions of settlement, then I shall feel that my second visit to Canada has not been in vain. The more I see of Canada, the more highly I appreciate the great inducements sho offers, both to capital and to labor, and the more highly do I prize the true kindness and genuine courtesy which Canadians are so ready to bestow.

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
