

YORK COUNTY AND SUBURBS LINING UP FOR HYDRO-ELECTRIC

Several Towns North of Toronto May Use Government Power.

ELECTING A WARDEN Spirited Contest in York Council—News From Many Districts.

The electors of the Township of West Gwillimbury will have a chance to say whether they are in favor of obtaining from the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario a supply of electric power. The vote will be taken on Wednesday, Feb. 12. The Township of West Gwillimbury, and the Township of North Gwillimbury, are already lining up in favor of hydro-electric power. At a meeting of the Township of West Gwillimbury, held last week, the township was instructed to procure an estimate on the cost of 150 horse-power for that township. With these towns asking for this power the price will not be very materially lowered in Bradford and West Gwillimbury.

To Elect Warden. The York County Council will hold their annual meeting in the county buildings, East Adelaide street, next Tuesday at 2 o'clock. There will be a hot contest for the warden's chair, but who the successful contestant for 1913 will be is hard to predict, as there are many new members in this year's make-up of the council, and whose preference for their presidential officer is not known yet.

REAL ESTATE NEWS

Here a dozen storekeepers in the building belonging to Jas. and Harry Ryrie must get out by next Saturday, because of the fact that they are demolishing the buildings for a new structure. These merchants, while not in the \$10,000 a year rent class, still are big enough for their wares to be important.

And to the trials of business men forced to find locations must be added the unrest among the occupants of buildings rumored marked for early removal. Lower town Toronto is big this process of growing up sometimes rather uncomfortable, but the side streets will be gladened.

Spread "Downtown"
A Hundred New Offices and Stores Must Be Found Soon.

Some ten tenants in the old Jones building at the corner of King and Yonge streets, and who have ground floor fronts, are hastily scurrying around downtown looking for new locations. They need not vacate till July, yet six months is too short a notice considering the scarcity of downtown stores and offices. Most of these people who have been enjoying locations right in the busiest part of town will have to seek side streets unless they will go two or three blocks on King either east or west of Yonge, or else go north near Winton.

The sixty-five tenants upstairs are going to have just as much trouble in finding new locations. Office space is at a premium. The medium priced space of the \$150 a foot class is now to be found, and the higher priced room is disappearing as fast as space is rented in the C.P.R. building which is pretty fast.

The tens situation of all is at the corner of Yonge and Shuter streets.

APARTMENT NEAR COX RESIDENCE

Corner of Sherbourne and Wellesley Bought by Builders For 300-Roomed House.

Senator Cox is to have a \$175,000 apartment house as a near neighbor. The southeast corner of Sherbourne and Wellesley streets, running back to Fleetwood street, a plot 100 feet frontage by 200 feet deep, has been bought by Deeth & Sons, Limited, builders, from William Grogan, thru Goulding & Hamilton, at \$35,000. The house on the land formerly belonged to the Macons and cost far more than the present price to build. It is used now as a home for Wellesley Hospital nurses and will be torn down at once. There is a restriction on the Sherbourne street front of the lot that prohibits apartments. The city may see fit to remove this. If not instead of a 300-roomed house, an apartment of 125 rooms will be built on the back part of the lot which is a hundred feet north of Senator Cox's home.
