Col. Sam Hughes, at Canadian Club, Extols Cadet System.

NO ROOM FOR CANTEEN

In Camp of the Future, Declares Minister of Miltia.

"If war was wiped off the face of the earth, I would still train boys in military discipline by the cadet system. The mili-tary-trained boy makes a much better type of citizen than does the civilian-trained boy." So stated Col. the Hon. Sam Hughes, Canadian Minister of Militia, at the Canadian Club last night. The drill halls in Toronto had done more good than any other institutions, with the possible exception of the churches, stated Col. Hughes, both in fostering citizens and making them men worth being proud of. He declared he had rid Canada of the prejudice against militarism. "Ninety-eight per cent. of the people from ocean to ocean are at our backs in the cadet system," said the colonel.

"Commanders must keep the canteen cut of the camp," continued Col. Haghes. "If they can t, then we'll have to keep them out, and I am pleased to say that siready some of them have gone out. No one would ever think of introducing the canteen in a collegiate. Why should they do it in a training camp for young men?" he demanded.

That the peace advocates would be up to their elbows in war in order to pucky Mexico by cutting the throats of the rebels, was a prediction made by Col. Hughes in speaking of the situation in Mexico. The trip to Europe of the army officers had been a very successful one, and Col. Hughes was proud of the expenditure in this connection. Not only had the trip greatly educated the officers, who enjoyed it, but it had benefited the officers who remained at home, for it toucht them to prepare for such a trip. Many of the men had taken their wives along, and the col nel meant to encourage this, as the women all returned with strong feelings of imperialism.
