


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BRITAIN BLASTED HOPES OF HUERTA

Carden's Intimation That U.S. Policy Was Endorsed Destroyed Last Prop. CRISIS NOW REACHED Dictator Must Surrender Office or Invasion Will Follow at Once.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 14.—President Huerta's last prop fell today when Sir Lionel Carden, accompanied by several members of the diplomatic corps, had an audience with him and notified him without reservation that England endorsed the United States policy toward Mexico. And it is now openly stated that unless Huerta complies with President Wilson's demands, an attack on O'Shaughnessy will be immediately begun thereafter for the landing of United States marines at Vera Cruz under the protection of United States war vessels. It is probable that when the new congress meets tomorrow, Huerta first will be declared to have been elected president at the recent polling, but will then be declared ineligible to hold office, and that after that half vindication Huerta will announce his intention to resign.

Willing to Meet Lind. The first signal of concession that came from Huerta was when he sent word to Charge O'Shaughnessy that he was willing to discuss with John Lind, President Wilson's demand that the new Mexican Congress should not be allowed to meet, on the contention that this freshly elected body was in no way representative of popular opinion in Mexico. O'Shaughnessy would not discuss at any length the question of the interesting possibilities created by Huerta's overtures. He professed to be wholly in the dark as to whether President Wilson would be inclined to direct Mr. Lind to return here for discussion with Huerta or his representatives. At the same time there is no discounting the importance of these events as indicating that Huerta has undergone a change of heart, but it is pointed out that his message cannot be construed as containing anything in the nature of a direct promise to accede to President Wilson's demands. Nor does the message bind him to any pronounced policy one way or the other.

BUT TWO PER CENT. FROWN ON MILITIA

Col. Sam Hughes, at Canadian Club, Extols Cadet System. NO ROOM FOR CANTEN In Camp of the Future, Declares Minister of Militia.

"If war was wiped off the face of the earth, I would still train boys in military discipline by the cadet system. The military-trained boy makes a much better type of citizen than does the civilian-trained boy," so stated Col. the Hon. Sam Hughes, Canadian Minister of Militia, at the Canadian Club last night. The drill halls in Toronto had done more good than any other institutions, with the possible exception of the churches, stated Col. Hughes, both in fostering citizens and making them more worthy of the privilege of enlisting in the militia. "Ninety-eight per cent of the people from ocean to ocean are at our backs in the cadet system," said the colonel. "Commanders must keep the canteen out of their elbows in order to police Mexico by cutting the throats of the rebels, was a prediction made by Col. Hughes in speaking of the situation in Mexico. The trip to Europe of the army and the greatly educated officers, who enjoyed it, but it had benefited the boys who remained at home, for it taught them to prepare for such a trip. Many of the men had taken their wives along, and the col. had returned with strong feelings of imperialism.

(Continued From Page 1.) couldn't see, I knew within a mile or two where we were. "If you got out where the wind would strike you fair, if you weren't blown overboard your brains would have been smashed out on a stanchion. Feared for Crew. "My worry was that the crew would be washed overboard. The seas went over the pilot house. The anchors didn't hold and we went on the beach. We went on so hard I almost went thru the pilot house. That was about 10 o'clock Sunday night. As soon as we were on I knew we were all right. As I said before, if I hadn't tried to save the boat, I could have saved myself a lot of hardship. Capt. May stated that the Harwood's bottom was sprung upward thru having been thrown on a cobblestone ridge. "I have been master of boats for 21 years," said the captain, "but this was the worst I have ever encountered. Three Indians Drowned. Three Sarnia Indians are on the list of drowned from the steamer McGean. The bodies of the three sailors were found washed ashore five miles below Goderich. They were washed to a life raft lettered Steamer John A. McGean. The three bodies are those of George Smith, John Owen and Thomas Stone. Capt. May, in command of the McGean, resides some twelve miles below Sarnia at Sombra Village. It is believed that he, too, has perished. HEAVY FIRE LOSS AT BINGHAMPTON

Business Section Suffers Damage Estimated at Two Hundred Thousand. BINGHAMPTON, N.Y., Nov. 14.—(Can. Press.)—Tonight the firemen are still fighting the flames, which breaking out in the business section of the city this afternoon, due to a defective furnace chimney in the M. F. Thompson specialty warehouse at Court street and Commercial avenue, swept a half dozen business places. An estimate of \$200,000 loss is conservative. The heaviest loser is M. F. Thompson, \$75,000, insured; McKelloff Drug Co., \$30,000, insured; Hills, McLean & Haskins, \$25,000. Other heavy losers are H. A. Smith, C. A. Weed & Co., People's Bank, E. D. Ostrom, F. M. Beckley, G. M. Ricks & Son and G. A. Garner. Eight firemen were hurt.
