He suggested that each of the dominions and dependencies should be represented on the commission on a debt or population basis: Mr. Watt said that the commission hould be created and prepared to take wer the control of the various debts by December, 1919, and that all interest movement. uld be paid by the commission after cretion to establish more than one common stock, and to convert any loan before its maturity. Each government will pay a fixed annual sum to the ission, consisting of the interest on its debt and its sinking fund conconsiderable reduction in the interest charges, this saving could be added to the sinking fund. Therefore, the debts would be liquidated before 1991. At its discretion the commission could float any additional loans found necessary going into foreign countries, in order to secure money at the lowest rate of interest. **MUST NOT REDUCE**


