PROVINCIAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN MEETS

New Offshoot of Council of Women Begins First Conference.

yesterday when the first meeting of the newly formed provincial council with Dr. Stowe Gullen as president, was held at the Sherbourne House Club, delegates from different parts of the province being present.

Attention to resolutions which had been introduced at the late annual meeting of the National Council took up the first part of the session with a view to endorsation or other action. The request for a minimum wage was unanimously supported and will be one of the first things presented in the form of a resolution today at the parliament buildings, when a delegation will be received by the premier. The resolution will also ask for two women on the minimum wage board. Mrs. Bruce Taylor and Mrs. Hope of Hamilton were mover and seconder. Mrs. Willoughby Cummings pointed out the increased need for the ap-pointment of factory inspectors, the shops having trebled within the last 15 years and offices having been placed in the territory to be inspected. offices having been Dr. Gullen drew attention to the cvasion of the law to provide seats for employes in stores. Censorship of the "movies" was shown to be almost use-less under present conditions, the board of appeal having power to undo any decision of the censor. Sugges-tions to the government will be to do away with the board of appeal and to add women to the board of censors. A resolution asking a proper home for mentally defective was moved by Mrs. Twidale of Niagara Falls. Humane Education.

Other subjects which were endorsed were the introduction of what is technically termed "humane education" into the schools, the resolution of the Women Teachers' Association of On-tario asking for higher salary, "mothers' allowances" and a protest against the recent sentence of Judge Coatsworth in giving a man one year in a case where the law prescribed two. Legislation will also be asked to admit of association judges who shall be women, in all juvenile courts thruout the province

The following will speak on the delegation this morning: Dr. Augusta Stowe Gullen will introduce the delegation and ask for co-guardianship of children; Mrs. A. M. Huestis will speak on "Mothers' Allowances"; the minimum wage, Mrs. Bruce Taylor; censorship of films, Mrs. Horace Larsons; humane education, Mrs. Gilbert; care of the mentally defective, Mrs Twidale; increase of teachers' salacies, Mrs. Watt; injustice of some court sentences, Mrs. L.
