SUNDAY BROKE THE SPELL. HOUSE RISES AFTER A STRETCH OF 126 HOURS.

But Sir Charles Tupper Says the Remedial Bill Will be Taken Up Again To-Day. "That 'No Confidence in the Bred' Phrase Creates Much Discussion—Here Tills Between Members."

Ottawa, April 12.—(Special).—The morning watch yesterday was altogether devoid of exciting incidents. At 3:30 Mr. Martin moved to strike out clause 11 from the Remedial Bill. Mr. McNeill's objection to this was that it would prevent him from moving that the committee rise.

Mr. McNeill then made his motion to rise, and spoke to it for about an hour. He was succeeded by Mr. Wallace, who in the course of his remarks became effusively and unaccountably congratulatory to the member for L'Assomption.

Mr. Jeannette made a last attempt to appeal to the member for West York to desist. "Do you wish to ruin me with my constituents?" he enquired with mock gravity. "If so, you are taking the right way to do it."

Thereafter the House laughed and long as Mr. Wallace gave way to the big member for Guyborough. Mr. Fraser had little need to say anything, but he urged the cessation of hostilities with all the eloquence at his command.

Towards 7 o'clock when many of the morning watch had begun to go for breakfast, Colonel Tyrwhitt moved to continue the debate. He began to read the bill, when somebody questioned the propriety of his doing so. While this weighty question was under consideration, the Colonel was still reading, and he remarked: "Let us declare each clause of the bill carried as he reads it."

Mr. Macdowell—"As this bill has been read a first and second time, I suggest that this be considered the last reading." The Colonel took no notice of these interruptions, but proceeded with the bill, and read the great amendment of the French to the great amendment of the French.
