BUTTER FOR ENGLAND.

Mr. Reid of Grenville Wants a Bonus Pald Direct to Farmers to Encourage Good Work.

Ottawa, March 23.—In the House to-day Mr. Reid (Conservative, Grenville), offered a resolution declaring that the Government should take immediate steps to do something more to assist in the development of our butter trade, "and this House is of the opinion that the Government should place in the estimates for the present session an amount to be paid to the farmers direct, by way of a bonus of one cent per pound, on a specified quantity of our finest fresh creamery butter to be exported to Great Britain, while fresh and in condition to secure a while fresh and in condition to secure a reputation for itself and establish a lasting demand, and that this bonus be continued for three consecutive years. The bonus to be increased at the discretion of the Government on butter made during the winter months. All such butter to be subject to a rigid Government inspection.

That this bonus be paid to only those farmers who will furnish for export regular

farmers who will furnish for export regular supplies."

Impetus to Dairy Farming.

The mover contended that the Canadian supply of cheese to Great Britain has reached a satisfactory point, and that the best impetus which could be given to dairy farming in Canada would be the encouragement of the butter industry. While the Dominion supplied but a very small portion of the British butter supply, there could no doubt it was as rich a dairy country as any of those countries from which the bulk of that supply was drawn. He therefore urged a bonus to the manufacturers of butter. That plan had worked well in Que bec, and those who were opposed to it were not farmers but dealers and exporters, and he wanted the bonus paid to the farmer direct.

Mr. Osler objected to all this sort of grandmotherly legislation. He objected to Mr. Charlton posing as if he had a power of fartoney from the Almighty to tell the people what they mast on to do. One of his objections to New York was the obtuning of its Sunday papers, but we had nothing of the sort in Canada.
