REBELS OF THE BRIDGE. FRESH FIGHTING ON CANAL. SOUTHERN GREECE SHAKEN. Earthquake Throughout the Peloponnesus Which Has Made Many People Homeless.

Belgian Troops Have Suffered Heavy Losses, Some White Officers Being Killed. REAL TRUTH HAS BEEN HIDDEN. WHOLE VILLAGES WERE DESTROYED. Inhabitants Camping Out in the Suburbs and Afraid to Return to Their Homes.

Brussels, Jan. 22.—There has been fresh fighting in the Congo State, Le Patrole announces to-day between the Belgian troops and the rebels, the former having sustained heavy losses, including some white officers killed. Le Patrole says: "The real truth as to the situation in the Congo State is being hidden. The losses of the Congo State troops of late have been much understated here. The whole country is in a ferment, and the rebellion is not being put down. The Government troops appear to fear the rebels, and the prestige of the whites has been much impaired."

Athens, Jan. 22.—A strong seismic disturbance was felt at a moment about half-past 9 o'clock throughout the Peloponnesus (the southern portion of the Kingdom of Greece), especially in the southwestern departments of the peninsula. All the houses in the town of Filiatra, in the department of Messinia on the Ionian coast, have been damaged, and the inhabitants are now camping out in the suburbs. Two villages in the vicinity of Filiatra were completely destroyed, many people being slightly injured.

The villages of Kyparissia and Staze were scarcely practically destroyed, though it is not known as yet whether there were any victims there. Much damage to property was done at Navarino, a seaport in the gulf north of Jodou, whose harbor witnessed the victory of the English, French and Russian fleets over those of the Turks and Egyptians in 1827; and considerable damage is reported from the village of Kapodistria, the seat of the government of Messinia, near the head of the Gulf of Koron.

The shock was severely felt in the District of Zante, capital of the Ionian island of that name, but there was no loss of life or property there. Many white officers have occurred during the day, and the authorities are doing all in their power to furnish tents and supplies.

Money Flowed in Freely. The Hamiltons Started the Ball Rolling and \$427,000 Was Pledged for Pan-American Exhibition. Buffalo, Jan. 22.—A banquet was tendered Mayor Diehl at the Hotel Iroquois last night by the incorporators of the Pan-American Exposition, which it is proposed to hold in this city in 1901. Over 300 representative business men were in attendance. During the evening it was announced that William Hamilton had agreed to pay \$5000 cash for the first ticket of admission to the exposition. C. J. Hamilton, the veteran horseman, offered a similar sum for the second ticket, and Mr. Henry, repeated the offer for ticket No. 3. Then followed a perfect food of subscriptions, and in two hours \$427,000 had been raised, and enough more pledged to bring the amount up to an even \$500,000. This assures the success of the scheme, as Congress is already pledged to a large appropriation. The idea of holding the exposition on a narrow strip of land between the Erie River, has been abandoned, and a site in close proximity to the city is to be selected.
