

COMMEMORATING THE SIEGE

A Medal Will Be Struck Bearing the Legend, "Men, Not Walls, Make a City."

SCENES IN BRITISH LEGATION.

A Great Crowd of All Nationalities Jostled Each Other—Shells Did Awful Work.

Pekin, Aug. 14, by post, via Tien Tsin.—A medal will be struck commemorating the siege of Peking. It will bear the legend, "Men, not walls, make a city."

Three the ruins of the foreign settlement an eager, cosmopolitan crowd is jostling—Indians, Cosacks, legation ladies, diplomats, Americans from the Philippines, and French disciplinarians from Saigon.

A Much-Mixed Crowd.—The scene of the siege is a most interesting one. The ruins of the foreign settlement are a mass of stone and brick walls and earthworks.

Back of the United States Legation is a work named "Fort Myers" which the marines held, completely screening both sides of the walls, with steps leading to it.

Torn by Chinese Shells.—The tops of the American and British buildings were badly torn by Chinese shells.

Eleven Civilians Killed.—Four hundred and fourteen people lived in the compound and the greater part of the siege.

Additional Details.—The army transport, when it reached Peking, was a unique spectacle. Miles of animals, vehicles and coolies trailed behind everything imaginable on wheels.

A Great Reception.—The reception which awaited the army was worth the hardships the troops had undergone.

An hour afterward Gen. Chaffee, riding at the head of the American infantry, marched to the Tartar wall.

Legations Fiercely Attacked.—The legations were fiercely attacked from July 17 to 23. The Chinese repeatedly violated the armistice.

They Never Despaired.—The foreigners, however, never despaired. They held on bravely during the siege.

A Notable Achievement.—The relief of Peking was a notable achievement. The Chinese soldiers were in front of Peking.

Escaped Convicts Shot.—Chatanooga, Tenn., Aug. 31.—Wesley Austin and Bob Armstrong, two escaped convicts, were killed.
