## GREATER DOMINION DAY THAN HAS BEEN, SAY ALL

Resorts In and About Toronto Crowded With Happy Pleasure Seekers

Domination Day was differently spent than usual. The crowds stayed at home, or rather, confined their pilgrimages to city resorts instead of heaving themselves off to the pleasant country or crossing the lake. Usually, the celebration of Canada's natal day means overwhelming business to the boat lines running out of Toronto. The Home-Comers' Festival kept a great many within the gates, and while the Niagara, St. Catharines, Hamilton and the other excursion steamers carried large crowds, they were not what the hot weather would otherwise have brought them.

**Record Crowd at Island.**  
The Island was a popular place and over 35,000 were carried across the bay, making a record. Of the number, 27,000 passed thru the gates at the foot of Yonge-street and the jam during the early hours of the afternoon was awful. The Toronto Athletic Club's croquet match was witnessed by 6,000 people and all the amusements were in full swing. The refreshment booths did a rushing business all day. Those who sought for rest alone found it at Island Park, where hundreds of picnic parties spent the day. Manager Solman was especially pleased that no accident in transporting the crowds had occurred to mar the day.

**Shelter in the Parks.**  
The Street Railway lines to the various parks were also taxed. High Park with its sheltering hill and dale, and its fine stretch of beach, was the chosen picnic ground for several thousands. The Reservoir and Rosedale had their bands of pleasure seekers. Queen's Park and the Horticultural Gardens afforded pleasant opportunity for quiet recreation. The Riverside Zoo was the Mecca of the biggest crowds of all. The heavy gale that blew up during the morning continued into the afternoon and yachtsmen had exciting times. There were several upsets, but happily no fatalities.

**S.O.E. DEMONSTRATION.**  
About 15,000 People Enjoyed Day at Exhibition Park.

The combined lodges of the Sons of England of the Toronto District held a monster demonstration at Exhibition Park on Dominion Day, and the affair was a magnificent success. It is estimated that 15,000 people were present during the afternoon and evening, and when the last strains of the National Anthem were played at 10 o'clock in the evening a tired but greatly satisfied crowd turned homeward.

The afternoon was taken up largely with games, amusements and vaudeville entertainment on the stage in front of the grand stand. The vaudeville entertainment was repeated, with some additions, in the evening, and was concluded with a series of moving pictures of a patriotic character. The Governor-General's Body Guard band was on the grounds all day, and Payne's orchestra furnished the music for the dancing, which was carried on under the grand stand. Among the artists who performed on the stage were the Electricians who evoked hearty applause. Several burlesque acts were put on, and these, too, were greatly enjoyed.

Among the civic dignitaries present were Mayor Urquhart, Ald. S. W. Burns, Ald. W. Hamilton, Ald. Richardson, Ald. Bell and Ald. Graham. Ald. S. W. Burns presented the prizes. The officers of the day were: 12, Ward, chairman; T. H. Carter, treasurer; C. Sims, secretary. They were assisted by an energetic committee, who deserve credit for the success of the affair.

The G.T.R. section men between East Toronto and Newcastle are on strike for a week pay on account of extra services rendered.


