London Convalescent Home, on York street, near Burwell, held their eighth annual meeting yesterday afternoon in the home parlors. The meeting is usually held about Oct. 1, but was postponed this year, owing to the absence of some of the officers, and for other reasons. Dean Innes and Canon Richardson conducted devotional exercises, and also spoke of the work of the home. There was a large attendance, and the members were highly pleased with the reports of the year's work

Mrs. Harriet A. Boomer, the president, in her report, stated that the home had been again blessed with such a full measure of growth, progress, and prosperity, that they had once more been enabled to carry out the purposes for which the home was established. In addition to having met all payments due for maintenance, fuel, water rates, salaries, insurance, etc., they had paid off anhome, leaving a payment of \$750 still to be met. Continuing, she said: "Perhaps that our total indebtedness was not further reduced is due to the fact that we have made no special effort towards wiping out the mortgage this year, and it will be for the friends of the home to consider if some such special effort may not be made in the year upon which we are now entering. By the careful economy of our purchasing committee, supplemented by the many gifts from friends of the home, to whom our sincere thanks are most justly due, the cost of maintenance has been reduced to a minimum, without in the least interfering with the full and sufficient provision which has always been made for the comfort of the in-

"The matron's register records the following: Between Oct. 1, 1895, and Oct. 1, 1896, admissions 27, in residence 5; total, 32. Of these, 25 were women, and 7 men; 5 were Roman Catholics, 27 Protestants of all denominations. Their nationalities were: Canada, 8; England, 18; Ireland, 2; Scotland, 4. Of the above, 16 came from the hospitals, the remainder directly from the city. Their collective was 1,094 days, their average stay about 36 days. Twenty-two of our inmates were unable to pay anything whatever, the remainder only in part, the majority of these paying but a very small proportion only. Indeed, the whole amount received from inmates for this year was but \$43 25.
"Many cases admitted were those of females recovering from tions performed in the hospital. DESPERATE TRAMPS.

Hold Up a Train—Overpowered the Crev and Drove Them Into the Caboose.

New York, Nov. 5. — News from Port Jervis is to the effect that an Erie freight train has been held up by a gang of 15 desperate tramps on the Delaware division. They overpowered the crew, and frightened them into the caboose. The tramps were first observed on Conductor J. H. The conductor and train-men, with the assistance of Agent Bird, of Callicoon, tried to eject the tramps, but they displayed two or three revolvers, and as the railroad men were unarmed they returned to the caboose, and the train proceeded on its way to Port Jervis.
