rest everyone attempting to enter or leave the building. Three of Guerin's friends who attempted to leave the place this morning were arrested. They all carried six-chambered revolvers and hatchets, and what Frenchmen designate as "American knuckle-dusters," otherwise brass knuckles. The prefect of police is still awaiting orders from the government in regard to the action to be taken against Guerin.
