One Liberal westerner today announced that he will speak against the plebiscite, namely Thomas MacNutt of Salt Coats. He favors the referendum as a general principle, but doubts the practicability of taking a soldiers' vote. W. S. Loggie is a Liberal, New Brunswick, who will oppose the referendum.
