BREAKFAST-Stewed apricots. Veal hash on toast. Fried sweet * potatoes. Egg rolls. Coffee.

LUNCHEON-Spiced beef relish.

Cut out these recipes and paste them

in a scrap-book. Egg Rolls-Two eggs well beaten, one teacup of milk, one tablespoon of lard, a pinch of salt, two teaspoons baking powder and two pints of flour.

Roll out, cut, and bake in a hot oven. Spiced Beef Relish-Take two pounds of raw, tender beef, chop very fine, put into it a half teaspoon of salt, quarter teaspoonful of pepper, half teaspoon of sage, and two tablespoonfuls of melted butter; add two rolled crackers made very fine, also two well-beaten eggs. Make it in shape of a roll and bake it. Baste with butter and water. Slice when cold.

Hominy Croquettes-To a cupful of seasoned cold boiled hominy, add a teaspoon of melted butter, stir well, add a cup of milk gradually until it is all a light paste. Add a quarter aspoon salt and a well-beaten egg. Roll in balls, dip in beaten egg, then cracker crumbs, and fry in hot lard.

Slip-Slip in a bonny-clabber without its acidity and so delicate that some like it as well as ice cream. Make a quart of milk warm, then stir in one tablespoon of rennet; set it by, and when cool again will be as stiff as Dodd's Kidney Pills Are First Favorites jelly. Baked Berry Rolls-Roll rich biscuit dough thin, cut in pieces four by seven inches, spread over with canned berries, roll up and bake in a dripping pan. Strew over a handful of sugar, four tablesponfuls hot water. Serve with sauce, if liked, or eaten plain.

Nantucket Pudding-One quart of any canned fruit, two tablespoons flour, same of sugar, simmered together and turn into molds; cover with frosting as for cake, or whipped cream and sugar, browning lightly in the oven. Serve with cream.

A Great Gathering at Toronto Last Night.

Sir Richard Cartwright on Progress Under Liberal Rule.

Canada's Trade Makes a Phenomenal Increase.

The Ontario General Elections Discussed by Sir Richard and

Premier Hardy. Bright Prospects for the Success of the

Liberals in the Ensuing Contest. Toronto, Jan. 20 .- The banquet of the Young Liberal Club last night was a great success. The principal speakers were Sir Richard Cartwright, minister of trade and commerce, and Premier thusiastic reception. The tone of the

addresses proved that the national horizon is rapidly widening and that developments within the arctic circle. in far northwest Canada, and in the far east, with which we would have had but a remote connection in preconfederation days, are now of importance to every Canadian, whether of the east or of the west.

Sir Richard Cartwright made an ex-

ceedingly happy and inspiriting speech. He pointed with pardonable pride to the expansion of trade as an evidence that Liberal government had been very far from the disastrous thing predicted by the Conservatives eighteen months ago. In the first year of Liberal rule the expansion eral rule the exports had increased from \$109,915,000 to \$123,933,000, an increase of \$14,000,000, the greatest with in a twelvementh within his knowledge. In the first five months of the present fiscal year the exports of Canadian products had reached the great total of \$74,896,000, another increase of \$14,000,000, as compared with the same five months of last year. In all, therefore, Liberal rule had been accompanied-he did not pretend to say it was wholly due to Liberal rule-by the enormous expansion of \$28,000,000 in out exports within 17 months. This statement was greeted with tumultous cheering. In the latter part of his speech Sir Richard dealt with the problems of Klondike development, and of the relations of Canada as a North American state to the empire. The greatest fact of the century politically was that two-thirds of the Anglo-Saxon race found their homes in the North American continent. To the sentiment that the Anglo-Saxons north of the line were not prepared to barter their national existence for trade there was a splendid response, but he warned his hearers that it would Richard declared it to be the duty of anadians to the Anglo-Saxon race to do everything possible to remove all prejudices and misunderstandings between the two great branches of the race. The government's majority had increased 22 to something like 47. Since that time they had faced their foes on many occasions and had always been victorious. In Prince Edward Island they beat them in the ratio of two to one; in the sister province of Nova Scotia, the home of the Tuppers, be it remembered, he was creditably informed that it was the intention of the government to introduce an alteration of the rules of parliament in order to enable the present opposition to call for a division when they desired. The rule of parliament was that it required five to get a division. The opposition consisted of one leader, one private and one Tupperonian, and there were difficulties in obtaining a division unless the government lent them one of their supporters. Of Quebec he said that he would not speak. There were circumstances which might well call for a defeat on the part of the Liberals, but all knew how completely their political friends were overthrown. Could it be possible, he asked, that the great Liberal province of Ontario would be the first to check the tide of Liberal victory? (Cries of "No!") He could not think it, and if it were so all he could say was that the province of Ontario would show itself extremely ungrateful, to say the least of it, to the men who during the last quarter of a century had maintained an unblemished record in every sense, and who, if entrusted again with the reins of power would continue to pursue the same cour of good conduct that had disting them during all that period. 
