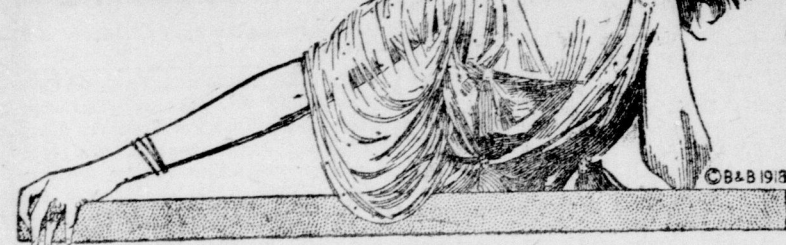

GERMANS RAID BOTH FLANKS OF CANADIAN LINE

Operation on Fairly Large Scale Under Cover of Heavy Barrage.

FEELERS FOR BIG DRIVE?

Few Prisoners Captured by the Enemy—Many Raids Effected by Allies.

LONDON, May 24.—A German raid was carried out last night in the neighborhood of Hucoquo, southwest of Arras, according to the official statement issued by the war office tonight. The text of the statement reads:

"Under cover of a heavy artillery barrage the enemy carried out a raid last night in the neighborhood of Hucoquo. A few of our men are missing."

"A few prisoners were brought in from the different parts of the front by the British and French patrols."

"Today's earlier statement said: 'As a result of a raid carried out by the enemy yesterday north of Hill 70 (north of Lens), a few of our men are missing. Early last night the enemy attempted another raid on one of our posts in Aveluy Wood, but was driven back.'"

"We carried out a successful raid shortly after midnight southwest of La Bassée and captured a few prisoners."

"A few prisoners were secured by us in a patrol encounter north of the Ypres-Comines Canal."

"The hostile artillery was active last night west of Lens and in the neighborhood of Ghenvy and Festubert. Our positions in the forest of Nieppe section were bombarded with gas shells."

RAIDS BY FRENCH AT SEVERAL POINTS.

PARIS, May 24.—"French troops last night carried out raids along several parts of the front, notably southeast of Comy, on the Aisne front, in the Champagne and in the Vosges, in which prisoners were taken."

"One of our detachments penetrated the German line south of the Champagne, northwest of Lassigny, during a sortie. An enemy raid east of Compiègne failed."

"There was intermittent shelling at several points on the front."

GERMANS MAKE SHIFT ON AMERICAN FRONT.

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, May 24.—By the Associated Press.—German troops which faced the Americans along the Toul sector for several weeks have been withdrawn and sent to the battle area of Northern France. They have been replaced by the eighth Bavarian division of reserves.

HEAVY FIRING AT POINTS OF WEDGES.

BERLIN, via London, May 24.—The war office communication issued today says:

"The artillery activity was revived last evening in the Kemmel region, and on both sides of the Lys and the Scarpe. South of the Somme, between Moreuil and Mondouville, it was also lively during the night."

"The infantry activity was limited to reconnoitering engagements."

"Prisoners were brought in as the result of five raids carried out by us southwest of Duquoy, and on the Oise."

WINNIPEG'S STRIKE FINALLY SETTLED; COUNCIL GIVES IN

Plan of Committee of One Hundred Accepted.

CARS AGAIN RUNNING

Work to Resume in All Branches of Work Affected.

WINNIPEG, May 24.—Winnipeg's civic strike is over. The strikers will return to work within a few hours. Street car service will be resumed immediately.

The council in caucus this afternoon reached an agreement, accepting the proposal of the committee of one hundred, which is now a fact.

The only thing the city gained is that the strikers and captains cannot be in the streets. The strikers must be reinstated by Wednesday.

Though an agreement has been signed between the city council and the strikers, it is now a hitch as the reinstatement of all strikers, owing to some positions having been supposedly permanently filled.

KURSK COUNCIL CALLS FOR MOBILIZATION TO STOP GERMAN INVASION

LONDON, May 24.—A large German force is reported within twenty-five miles of Kursk, in the Dnieper-Don region, about 300 miles southwest of Moscow, says an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Moscow, dated May 16.

The Kursk Council of Soldiers and Workmen, the dispatch states, has decided to declare a "revolutionary mobilization" for defensive purposes because of the "critical situation created by the German invasion in violation of the Brest-Litovsk treaty."

SPEECH FROM THE THRONE SUMMARIZING BIG THINGS OF PARLIAMENT IS SKIMPY

Ottawa, May 24.—In the speech from the throne delivered at 1 o'clock in the morning, his excellency referred to the new situation which had arisen in the European war as a result of the defeat of the German army.

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ENEMY CUTTING ZEEBRUGGE PIER TO GET OUTLET

Photographs Prove Completeness of the British Blockade.

LONDON, May 24.—Having failed in attempts to blow up the two concrete-laden ships sunk in the entrance to the Bruges Canal at Zeebrugge, the Germans are now engaged in cutting away the piers in an attempt to outflank the obstruction.

The photographs, which have been taken by British naval airmen show this, and they show how completely the canal entrance has been blocked.

So the Germans have adopted the expedient of removing the piers on the west side of the canal in order to make a large enough channel for torpedoes and other vessels larger than submarines to pass out to sea.

LONDONER IS HONORED AT INTER-PROVINCIAL B. Y. P. U. CONFERENCE

Rev. A. C. Bingham Elected Vice-President at Ingersoll Meeting.

INGERSOLL, May 24.—The inter-provincial meeting of the Baptist Young People's Union, which was concluded this evening, was a most successful session ever held under similar auspices.

All parts of Ontario were represented by delegates, 215 of whom registered. The speeches were outstanding in their influence and comprehensive grasp of the phases of young people's work discussed.

During the convention the announcement made that 1,200 of the young men claiming connection with the organization are fighting for the principles of democracy.

Interest was displayed by the public in each of the sessions today, particularly in the afternoon and tonight. At the morning session Rev. A. C. Bingham of London discussed "The Group System."

At the afternoon session Rev. C. H. Schutt was leader, and the speakers were Dr. James A. Smith of Chicago, and Rev. W. H. Langston of Paris.

Tough addresses were delivered by Dr. White of Chicago, and Rev. J. B. McLaurin of India.

The following officers were elected: Hon. president, Rev. E. R. Pritch, Waterloo; president, F. S. Heskins, C. Bingham, London; 2nd vice-president, J. T. Bovey, Toronto; 3rd vice-president, Dr. Wearing, Woodstock; secretary-treasurer, W. Fred Reynolds, Brockville.

Dr. Wearing, Woodstock, was elected secretary-treasurer.
