AUSTRIAN ARRESTED SNOXELLS BADLY BURNED

Charles Cahill Injured on Brantford and Hamilton Railroad—General City News.

HAMILTON, April 15.—(Special.)—Charles Cahill, 199 East Ferrie-street, a workman on the Brantford and Hamilton Railroad, was brought to the City Hospital this evening suffering from a severe injury to his back.

Henry Snoxells, 35 North James-street, had his legs badly burned this afternoon at the Diamond Glass Co.'s factory.

James Metriello, 25 Guelph-street, employed by George Webb, had his arm broken this afternoon.

An Austrian, whose name is not known, was arrested this evening on the charge of stealing lumber from the Grand Trunk Railway.

Cells a Disgrace.

At a meeting of the police commissioners to-day T. H. Pratt complained that the cells at No. 3 police station were not fit for human beings, and that they were a disgrace to the city.

The commissioners made an immediate inspection, and were of the same opinion as Mr. Pratt. Action will be taken at the next meeting.

The commissioners declined to make any changes in the rules governing the police benefit funds. Twenty-one applicants for positions as constables were examined, and the following were selected: H. Birch, Mount Brydges; David H. Pickett, Lowville, and E. Pettit, Copetown. All are over six feet one inch in height.

Four Years in Kingston.

Alex Cudney Guilty of Wholesale Theft.

QUELPH, April 15.—Alex. Cudney was this morning sentenced by Judge Chadwick to four years in Kingston Penitentiary. Cudney was the man arrested for committing numerous burglaries in the city and the surrounding country. A search of an old hotel near Marlet where he made his home, revealed a quantity of stolen goods of all descriptions, from dry goods and tools of all kinds to jewelry and watches. The value of the goods recovered amounted to about a thousand dollars. Goods were found at his home that had been missed since burglaries committed in 1906.

Jas. Scarrow, his alleged accomplice, who was brought here from Palmerston, also appeared before Judge Chadwick this morning on the Reid and Ross burglary charge and was dismissed.

Cocaine Made Him Thief.

NEW YORK, April 15.—Franklin H. Gray of the Roxbury section of Boston, who said he was formerly a newspaperman at Niagara Falls, N. Y., was held by the grand jury to-day on a charge of obtaining \$465 worth of jewelry from the Wanamaker department store by means of a forged order.

Gray was being sheltered in a settlement house, until he could find work, admitted the truth of the charge to court and he said that cocaine had brought him into the trouble.

Duffy Sent to Prison.

NEW YORK, April 15.—Frank Duffy, an election district captain who had been convicted of having assisted 30 men to vote falsely at the last election, was sentenced to-day to not more than two years and three months and three months in prison. The punishment was meted out in spite of more than 200 letters asking for clemency.

WEALTH IN THE WALLS.

Where William Jones Had Placed It for Safe-Keeping.

NEW YORK, April 15.—Convinced that William Jones, who died last fall at Hempstead, L. I., had possessed a considerable amount of money, the executors of his will made a thorough search of his property and finally decided to tear down the dilapidated cottage in which the man had spent his life.

After a portion of the wall had been taken down the workmen found two bags, one containing \$5000 in gold, the other \$8000 in bank notes. Later they discovered bank books which would bring the value of the estate to \$25,000.

LAW AGAINST BIG HATS.

Cannot See Ball Game Behind "Merry Widow" Creation.

CINCINNATI, April 15.—At a meeting of the city council, Councilman O'Brien of the sixth ward presented an ordinance providing that any woman wearing a big hat at the National League Base Ball Park must remove the hat before the game commences in order that those men who have paid to see the game may be able to do so.

The council referred the resolution back to the committee on law, of which O'Brien is chairman. The proposed ordinance provides for a fine of \$50 for each violation of it.

MAY RETURN DONOVAN.

Brookville May Give Him Seat by Acclamation.

BROOKVILLE, April 15.—(Special.)—In view of the approaching provincial elections there is considerable stir locally in political circles.

The Conservative Association of the re-districted Brookville has called a convention for May 5 to select a candidate.

It is expected that there will be no opposition to the sitting member, E. Donovan, who succeeded Hon. G. P. Graham at the by-election.

Should a formal prosecution in France be decided upon it is understood that the depositions of witnesses would be taken in America and that it would not be necessary for them to come to France.

Isaac Schumacher and Samuel Wagner were each fined \$1 without costs by Magistrate Kingsford yesterday afternoon, for making bread on Sunday, April 12.

David Donovan is in the employ of an automobile supply company and he took out a machine that had no number on it. Donovan explained that he thought it was all right before he left and must have been lost. He was given a week to secure evidence.

Formed Joint Committee.

NEW YORK, April 15.—Representatives of the American Association of the National Clothing Manufacturers and here to-day and formed a joint committee. The announced purpose of the committee is to secure co-operation in efforts to improve the relations between and the conditions of the woolen and clothing industries.

Baker's License Canceled.

MONTREAL, April 15.—The officials of the local food inspection office, acting as a result of a number of complaints received during the past few days, have started a campaign against city bakers who keep establishments dark of cleanliness.
