TEN YEARS FOR TOMPKINS FOR ATTEMPTED HOLD-UP

Hamilton and Guelph Junction Railway in Operation This Year - Engineers in Session.

HAMILTON, July 27.—(Special).—Mark Tompkins was sent down for ten years by Judge Monk this morning for clubbing and attempting to hold up Fred Fortescue. He pleaded guilty, and the judge said that if it were not for the prisoner's wife and babe he would have made the sentence heavier. He pointed out that Tompkins had served two terms already, being sentenced to twelve years for assaulting and robbing Jack Cauley. The prisoner pleaded guilty by the advice of his lawyer, as he had when sentenced to twelve years. On both occasions he demurred and criticized his lawyer for giving such advice. Edward Hughes, counsel for the prisoner, said that he would have made the sentence heavier. Hold Back Anarchy. "All that holds back anarchy is the poor organizations," declared W. B. Locomotive Engineers. About 2,000 delegates are attending the convention of the Canadian Union of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. The Hotel Royal is their headquarters. A secret session of the Brotherhood was held at Bennett's Theatre this morning, at which addresses were given by M. B. Prenter, Cleveland, first assistant grand engineer, and W. E. Fitch, president of the insurance department. Mr. Prenter said the Brotherhood had a membership of 64,000 with 779 branches. The La-

and thousands of dump material that will, when put thru the new concentrator, give \$50 to the ton. This dump is so large that handling many tons of the new concentrator will never be able to catch up if the men are as productive as they are to-day. Mr. Cartwright and his partner calculate that at least half a million dollars of silver is in this dump. The mine is doing all this work out of its own resources, encountered in the development work, building the big new mill, paying everything, borrowing no money. And yet speculators use the suspension of the dividends to bear the value of the shares of this property. Not that I do not think the management made a mistake when they started to pay dividends when they had so much work to do. Only close corporations or a phenomenal run of pure silver can justify such methods, and Crown Reserve happens to be one. The way that property has gone, it is paying all expenses of all kinds and paying out 36 per cent. dividends, not to say royalties. It is one of the surprising marvels of the camp. In 1910 Temiskaming ought to be paying dividends in the same way.

So much for what I saw underground and what it implies. I came up in the immediate neighborhood of Badger, Beaver, Cochrane, all about to make good by the methods similar to those the Temiskaming. These mines are four to five miles from the Kerr Lake Road from the town, are more south than the town, and getting close to the northern bound of the Gillies limit. But due south of the Temiskaming is the great acreage of the Pan-Silver, also a Cartwright proposition, but in its shafts and tunnels, it also made good. It was on this Pan-Silver that I saw a white calcite vein six feet in width at the surface, also a similar quartz vein. They must have big values at depth, and when they are struck it will be no ordinary affair. Still further south is the Gifford-Extension, with the same big veins, and then the line of the Gillies limit. With Temiskaming so near all indications show that one of the richest groups of the camps is in the Temiskaming corner.

And this modern kind of deep underground mining is now characteristic of the whole camp; La Rose, Niasing, O'Brien, Buffalo, McKinley-Darragh, Trethewey, Colunga, Right Way, Central, Kerr Lake, Crown Reserve, and a score of others that will be great producers in a few more months. The big mining, the deep mining, is now in Cobalt, and the one characteristic of this mining system, the best plan for a view to extensive output at the lowest cost. Cobalt has rich mines, it has now highly organized mines, and the geological area is about to be enormously increased by the inclusion of the Keewatin formation as one of the largest fields of ore.
