ANGLICANS IN NEED OF CATHEDRAL SYSTEM

Canon MacNab Calls Upon Faithful to Complete St. Alban's—Installation Ceremony.

"I say to you, without fear of contradiction, that the cathedral system well and effectively carried out in a Canadian diocese must prove a source of tremendous strength, and in fact it is the only way of preserving in its proper proportion the prerogative of the bishop, the loyalty of the priesthood, the rights of the laity, and the unity of the whole body of the faithful."

With this admonition Rev. A. W. MacNab, canon-in-charge of St. Alban's Cathedral, at the installation of the archdeacon and canons of the diocese last night, referred to the advantages of the cathedral system for Canada.

The regular form for installation canon was taken from the prayer book. Bishop Sweeney conducted the installation ceremony. The members of the chapter occupied stalls around the cathedral. WHITNEY WILL WAIT

Not Yet Time to Express Opinion on Navy Issue.

Following the declaration of Hon. R. P. Robt and F. D. Monk on the proposed contribution from Canada to an Imperial navy, The World asked Sir James Whitney yesterday what attitude he took as representing the people of Ontario. Sir James would not express any opinion on the actual proposal until they had been laid before the house of commons, but in regard to making the question a party issue, he had no uncertain view.

"In my opinion," he said, "no man who has any honest love for his country or for the British Empire will do anything to mix up any more than is possible this great question of our future relations in the British Empire and party politics."

"Therefore until the scheme of the government and the comments of public men are laid fully before the people, I shall not be in any position to offer any specific opinion in the matter."

YOUTHFUL BANK ROBBER KILLS ONE, WOUNDS TWO

Attempts Escape by Auto and Rowboat—Saved From Lynching by a Russ.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 11.—In an attempt at bank robbery Arthur Hall of Louisville, a dealer in second-hand furniture, entered the Merchants' National Bank at New Albany, Ind., shortly before noon to-day and shot and killed J. Henry Fawcett, cashier, and seriously wounded John K. Woodward, president of the bank, and also wounded James R. Tucker, a negro chauffeur, probably fatally.

With a pistol in each hand Hall entered the bank, and after commanding everyone to throw up their hands and "get into the vault," began shooting. Fawcett was shot thru the chest and neck, and died almost instantly. President Woodward received a bullet thru the liver and his intestines also were perforated. Tucker, the chauffeur, was shot thru the body.

Immediately afterward the murderer rushed from the bank and tried to escape in an automobile, in which, at the point of a pistol, he had forced the negro chauffeur to drive him to New Albany from Louisville.

After the shooting at the bank the chauffeur, paralyzed with terror and apparently incapable of action, sat still when the robber jumped into the car and ordered him to speed up the machine. The robber then jumped out of the automobile, seized the negro in the back and ran two blocks to the Ohio River. He shot a skiff and was on his way to the Louisville side of the river before the frightened citizens of New Albany knew what had transpired.

An alarm was given thru a megaphone on a dredge and in a short time several policemen had started in pursuit in a fast motor boat.

Capturing their man they brought him to shore, where by a Russ Police Captain Adams kept back the crowd of 200 persons by announcing that the man had taken poison and was dead. The bandit was then taken in a patrol wagon to the New Albany jail and later was removed to the Southern Indiana Reformatory at Jeffersonville, to escape the mob, which, realizing that it had been tricked, had assembled around the jail when the reformatory was in his cell at the reformatory.

His Queer Story.

He said he had been around Louisville for several days. He did not know Tucker, the chauffeur, and declared Tucker was not implicated in the attempt on the bank.

"I won't tell my name—I have seven brothers and sisters. My father don't live with my mother, and all of them are not within 600 miles of this place. I never was in trouble but once. That was at Lexington, Ky., on Halloween, a long time ago," he said.

He seemed to be confused, but apparently is not insane. He confessed that he planned the robbery of the bank and says that he had no assistance.

To-night the bandit was identified as Thomas Jefferson Hall, and according to W. J. Hall, his father, he is but seventeen years old. The elder Hall, who has a furniture store here, said his son was a household tyrant and not insane at all.

"He is simply mean," said the father. Mr. Hall said that for the last few years, dime novels had been the youth's constant literature.

Among young Hall's effects was found a poverty-stricken cabinet, lined and outfitted like a room. It is believed he expected to escape with his loot to-day by yearning into the box and being shipped away. The box was consigned to "R. J. Smith, Knoxville, Tenn."

Improvements of I.C.R.

In order to improve the facilities already afforded the public by the government railways, and to enhance their value as part of the great transportation system of Canada, a bill would be submitted for the purpose of enabling the minister of railways, on the recommendation of the government railway's managing board, and subject to the approval of parliament, to trace any line or lines connecting with the Intercolonial Railway.

A measure would also be submitted for the purpose of rendering more effective the present legislation respecting combinations which unduly enhanced values.

Bills would also be introduced respecting banks and banking, insurance, navigable waters, and other matters, and the estimates would be submitted at an early date. In conclusion, his excellency said: "I pray the Almighty Lord that He may guide and bless our deliberations, and that they may bear fruit in a further increase of our country's prosperity and well-being."

Introduction of Members.

After listening to the speech from the throne, the members of the second chamber where the following new members who had been elected at by-elections during the recess were introduced: D. A. Zafornino, Montclair, E. Fortier, Lotbiniere, and J. M. Douglas Strathcona, Hon. MacKenzie King was introduced after the by-election in North West, rendered necessary by his appointment as minister of labor.

The speaker announced that the debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne would take place on Monday.

R. H. Borden stated that to-morrow the opposition would like to discuss the question of the delay in making certain judicial appointments in British Columbia. This refers to the fact that the British Columbia Government has created a court of appeal which came into effect on Nov. 2. It is probable that no judges will be appointed until after the provincial election.

The opposition leader asked regarding the report of the naval defence conference and the premier replied that he hoped to lay the papers on the table next week.

French and U. S. Tariffs.

In answer to a question by Mr. Borden as to whether the government had reports or information touching the operation of the United States tariff, which particularly affected Canada, or her relations with other countries, Mr. Fielding replied that the government had had no correspondence on the subject. They were unable to forecast the interpretation of the U. S. authorities, and before coming to any conclusion would await action by the United States Government.

The premier replied that he would call the attention of the minister of railways to the matter, whereupon the house adjourned.

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MADAME AN ACCOMPLICE IS STATE THEORY NOW

Judge Advocate Begins Address—Believes That Murder of Stepmother Not Premeditated.

PARIS, Nov. 11.—That Mme. Steinheil, aided by some unknown accomplice, murdered her husband so as to obtain her freedom to wed the wealthy and infatuated Maurice Boreder, but that the killing of her stepmother was unpremeditated and merely incidental to the intrigue, is the theory of the state, as outlined by Trouard Rollo, the judge advocate, in opening the argument of the prosecution this afternoon.

The prosecutor joined in the earlier declaration of M. Devalles, the presiding judge, that he would raise before the jury the general question of the complexity of the accused. This was interpreted as an acknowledgment that the evidence was not sufficient to maintain the charge that Mme. Steinheil was the principal and that he, therefore, would ask for her conviction as an accomplice.

Through the crushing arraignment to-day the woman sat with bowed head dejectedly buried in her arms on the rail.
