Mrs. Eddy's study of the Scriptures revealed the fact that the entire Bible record teaches conclusively that a right understanding of God has always brought dominion over all material con-ditions, and that when the knowledge of truth has been correctly applied it has always been attended by healing and regeneration. The Scriptures abound in evidence that to understand

God brings healing.

We are led thru the study of Christian Science to try to stop viewing man as sick and sinning, and to accept the fact of his righteousness and dominion, which is insisted upon thru-out the Bible, and to undertake to manifest this dominion over all things.
