REPORT A DECREASE IN UNEMPLOYMENT ARE AWAKENING TO

Bettered Conditions Largely a Result of Soldiers' Emergency Fund.

Ottawa, Feb. 4.—(Special)—A decrease in unemployed thruout the Dominion is reflected in the figures of the federal emergency appropriation department of the patriotic fund, which has been in operation since December 22 and whose purpose it is to help unemployed returned sold ers over the present winter. The labor department claims that unemployment is on the decrease, and it is believed for the returned men rather than pay out bonuses. In nearly all cases the men, if in a condition to take such positions, readily agree to do so, and attempts to defraud the fund have been few and far between.

Montreal, Feb. 4.—Three men were burned to death and a third badly injured in a fire which this afternoom destroyed the paint shop of the Blain carriage works, Fairmount avenue Fitteen men were working in the plant when the fire started, it is believed, by the accidental ignition of liquid veneer, Twelve of them barely escaped with their lives, one was rescued from the blazing place, and two were cut off.


