MAY WEATHER

FOR TWO YEARS

The Past Month Was Warmer

Than May of a Year

Ago.

May, 1908, was considerably warmer

than May, 1907, according to the

statistics compiled at the local observ-

atory. Nearly twice as much rain fell

this year as compared with last.

The holiday, Victoria Day, was the

hottest of the month, 87.5 degrees be-

ing registered. This is 8.5 degrees

higher than the hottest day last May,

when the highest point reached was

79.

The lowest temperature registered

during May, this year, was 27.5, on

May 4. The lowest last year was 24

degrees. The month of May, last year,

was much colder than this year on the

average.

The rainfall during the month to-

talied 4.99 inches, nearly twice as

much as last year, when 2.53 inches

were recorded.
