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THE CASE OF ADOLF BECK.

Committee of Inquiry Examines the Police Force.
London, Nov. 25.—The report of the committee of inquiry in the case of Adolf Beck, who for the crimes of William Thomas, alias John Smith, served a term of five years imprisonment in England on the charge of obtaining money and jewels from women and false pretences, places practically the entire blame for the miscarriage of justice upon the police. Beck, who was excluded from Beck's trial in 1886 all evidence favorable to the accused and who refused to state a case for the consideration of a higher court.

The committee finds that if the matter could have been brought before a higher court, a flaw in the proceedings must have been discovered and the conviction would have been quashed and that if there had been a qualified lawyer in the home office the real nature of the miscarriage would have been brought to the attention of the permanent under secretary for home affairs as to compel intervention. The report exonerates the police and officials from all charges of conspiracy, but finds that the action of the home office in dealing with the case was defective, owing to lack of legal training on the part of the subordinates.

The committee expresses the opinion that the establishment of a criminal court of appeal is not necessary and that more efficient by the introduction of a stronger legal element in the home office ought to be adequate to give complete relief of innocent persons convicted through mistakes of law or fact.

The officers of Toronto Garrison have decided to tender to the city of Sir Frederick Borden as early as a date as the minister of militia can be at liberty to accept the honor. It would have taken place some time ago, but Sir Frederick was prevented by parliamentary reasons, and an illness from attending to the wishes of the promoter. When asked regarding it to-day Col. Borden said that the tender would be made as soon as Sir Frederick was heard from.

Great Britain and the U. S.
Washington, Nov. 25.—The state department today announced that it was made that the United States government today has agreed to conclude with Great Britain an arbitration treaty identical with those recently signed with France, Germany and Spain. The treaty will be signed by Secretary Hay and Sir Mortimer Durand.

Identified as a Laborer.
Malden, Nov. 25.—The body of the man killed near here a few days ago has been identified as that of John Lyons, a laborer, well-known in and around Malden, Kent County, Ontario, who appeared from there only a day or two previous to meeting his death here. This identification refutes the story told by a London paper connecting the man killed here with the assault committed upon a young woman at Parkhill two weeks ago.

Starving and Destitute.
New York, Nov. 25.—The young woman whose body was found in a hush-hush hotel Monday night, and who apparently had committed suicide by turning on the gas, was identified as Jessie Volt, who lived for a time at College Point, L.I. She said there also that she was starving and destitute.

Advance in Dairying.
Reports from dairy instructors throughout the province indicate that proprietors who make many improvements in their dairy equipment during the year, and many new factories will be erected, as a result of the work done in the past season.

THE LARGE CONSTRUCTION OF YONGE STREET BRIDGE

Board of Control Stands by Building Bylaw—Clerk Appoints D. R. O's.

The board of control yesterday decided to press on the railway commission the necessity of the issuance of another order for the construction of the Yonge-street bridge. Notice of appeal from the order of the railway commission by the C.P.R. was read, and the mayor stated that an appeal lay to the supreme court on questions of law. Controller Hubbard then moved the proposition of the water front was put through with the understanding that the bridge was a part of the scheme, and people would never have consented to a dozen more tracks crossing Yonge-street unless the bridge was at once. The board was unanimous in the opinion that the erection of the bridge should be pushed.

The mayor referred to his motion regarding the expropriation of the street railway plant. "We are not in earnest about it," queried Controller Shaw. "I certainly was," replied his worship, "and I got a strong endorsement from the convention yesterday." The mayor wanted to bring the matter on today in a special session, but as Controller Spence would be absent it was adjourned until next week.

Clerk Appoints D.R.O's.
City Clerk Littlejohn submitted the bylaw providing for the appointment of deputy returning officers for the ensuing municipal elections. The clerk said he had struck off about a dozen names and had asked the board to select the men first in earnest of their fitness and then as nearly as possible making the sub-division in which they lived.

The sum of \$600 was appropriated for the expense of advertising the fire protection bylaw. One thousand dollars was also granted the clerk for general advertising account. The appropriation having been exhausted.

Will Enforce Bylaw.
City Architect McCallum reported on the question of "wired glass" in reference to the complaint of Mark Plaster Sons & Co. He stated that the rigid building bylaw, which stated that wired glass was cheaper than before, and it was necessary for proper fire protection, as well as fire curtains. The firm's letter from the fire underwriters, stating that a reduction in rates was made with their permits to erect, and when both were given a greater reduction was made. Both were not considered necessary, however.

Power Company Street Poles.
The Southern Light and Power Company was granted permission to erect poles on Bloor-street from the western city limit to Keele-street, and to carry wires across Indian Road, College-street and Spadina-avenue to the Dundas-street bridge, for the purpose of supplying power for the purpose located at the latter point. The city engineer, Mr. J. H. McCallum, gave notice to the request. The location of the poles must be approved; they must be set back from the street line, and the company must give a bond against liability for accidents.
