



MONEY PAID VON PAPAN SALARY, SAYS EMBASSY

Officials Deny Knowledge of Private Bank Account or How He Spent It

DOES NOT BELIEVE IT

Von Bernstorff Discredits Report Incriminating Documents Were Found on Recalled Attache.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—Press despatches from London (telling of the seizure of correspondence from Captain Franz Von Papan, recalled German military attache to the United States, when he reached Falmouth, Eng., on route to Germany, and relating that they showed that he had made frequent payments to persons charged with responsibility for blowing up munition plants and bridges in the U. S., aroused the deep interest in official and diplomatic circles here today. The development came as a sequel to the withdrawal of Captain Von Papan and his colleague, Captain Boy-Ed, the German naval attache, at the request of the Washington Government.

Bernstorff Don't Believe It. "I don't believe it," was the only comment of Count Von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, would

concerning the despatches. In German diplomatic quarters the impression was conveyed that it was thought possible Captain Von Papan had been connected with the published documents by British agents. It was argued as incredible that Von Papan, with the knowledge that his ship would be taken into a British port to be searched, would have carried any such correspondence as mentioned in the press despatches even if he possessed it.

Say It Was Salary. At the German embassy it was said that the ambassador had paid considerable money to Von Papan as salary and for the expense of such work as he was expected to conduct as military attache. Embassy officials had no knowledge of his private bank account or of how he disbursed the money.

Administration officials declined to comment on the despatches pending the receipt of copies of the correspondence, which have been turned over to the American embassy in London for transmission to the state department.

LONDON'S VIEW OF IT.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—The revelations in the correspondence of Capt. von Papan, recalled German military attache at Washington, called to America last night, have been recorded in the afternoon newspapers here as by far the most important news of the day. The despatches were received too late for editorial comment, but the display headlines refer to the "Amazing Disclosures," "Searchlight on the German Pot in America," "Bernhardt's Nervousness."

The Westminster Gazette appends the following note: "These remarkable documents show how strong has been the German effort to capture America."

PRINCE HENRY CALLED ON VISIT TO BERLIN

Possibly Goes Because of Kaiser's Illness—Birthday Festivities Have Been Canceled.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—Prince Henry of Prussia has been summoned to Berlin, according to Central News despatch from Berne.

It is also announced, says the despatch, that Emperor William's birthday festivities for Jan. 27 have been canceled.

Prince Henry of Prussia is a brother of the German Emperor, and the inference probably intended in the news agency despatch is that he is summoned to Berlin in connection with the illness of Emperor William. What appeared to be an authoritative announcement that the Emperor's illness was not serious was contained in a Berlin despatch earlier in the week.

A wireless message from Berlin today said the emperor has asked that his coming birthday be celebrated quietly and in prayer by the German nation, but that whoever wished to give a special expression to his feelings was urged to do so by gifts for the care of the afflicted in the war and of the soldiers' families.

DIES AT 102 IN ST. THOMAS.

ST. THOMAS, Ont., Jan. 15.—Sarah Horton, aged 102, died in the Elgin House of Industry here today. She was born in England in 1814, but above that nothing concerning her is known, as she had never mentioned having any relatives.

ONLY ONE OF CREW SAVED FROM BAYO

Spanish Steamer Lost Twenty-five Men After Striking a Floating Mine.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—Only one out of 26 members of the crew of the Spanish steamship Bayo, was saved when the vessel, on Thursday, was sunk by striking a floating mine, forty miles off the Port of La Rochelle. The Bayo was on the way from Huelva, Spain, to Bilbao. She was owned in England, was of 2,776 tons, 312 feet long and had been built at Whitby, England, in 1892.

SPEAKER OF SENATE HONORED BY STAFF

Col. Hon. A. C. P. Landry Presented With Bust of Himself on Seventieth Birthday.

By a Staff Reporter. OTTAWA, Jan. 15.—The Hon. A. C. P. Landry, speaker of the senate, was presented with a bust of himself today by the staff of the senate. The occasion was Col. Landry's 70th birthday, and it was simply a token of respect and affection by the officers of the senate, among whom the Speaker is very popular. The bust is the work of Mr. Laliberte, the well-known Montreal sculptor.

Major Chaplain, clerk of the senate, made the presentation and Col. Landry replied in both languages.

HALT PEACE DELEGATES AT BORDER OF GERMANY

Scandinavians Stopped by Hun Officials Are Returning to The Hague.

THE HAGUE, via London, Jan. 15.—Telegrams reached the peace headquarters here from Oldenzaal stating that a number of Danish and Swedish members of the expedition, while en route to their home countries, were stopped at the German frontier by German authorities, who refused them passage thru German territory. The Scandinavians are returning to The Hague.

The Swedish legation received a similar message, containing information that the reason given by the Germans was: "Because they are members of the Ford party."

Officials of the expedition are puzzled and wonder what will happen to them and afterwards, and whether the party here, as has been arranged in many cases.

ELECTED TO COMMONS.

Admiral Sir Hedworth Meux, Takes Seat Formerly Occupied by Lord Charles Bessborough.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—Admiral Sir Hedworth Meux, the retiring commander-in-chief of the Port of Portsmouth, was today elected to the seat held in the house of commons by Lord Charles Bessborough, and which had become vacant thru the elevation of the latter to the peerage. The election was unopposed.

PARIS, Jan. 14.—(Delayed).—A Havas despatch from Athens says that on Wednesday a squadron of German aeroplanes, from the direction of Unkup, made another raid over the camp of the allies at Saloniki. Bombs were dropped on the French positions, but did no damage, according to the despatch which adds that French aeroplanes arose and drove the raiders off.

HAND GRENADE FIGHTING REPORTED AT ARGONNE

PARIS, Jan. 15, via London, 3.40 p.m.—The following official statement was given out by the war office this afternoon:
