CRANBERRY CROP IS
EXCEPTIONALLY GOOD
This Year's Yield in Cornwallis and Annapolis Will be Worth \$25,000.

Halifax, N. S., Sept. 15.—Although the cranberry crop in the states is reported to be very small, in the Cornwallis Valley the crop is one of the best on record. Owners of bogs are watching closely for frosts and are burning fires at night to guard their crop. There are between 5,000 and 10,000 barrels in the Valley worth at least \$50.00 a barrel or a total of at least \$250,000. At Lower Weymouth the bogs of Messrs. Barr, Thurber, and Oakes, are in full bearing and the quality is first-class. There is also a large crop on the wild bogs along the Sissiboo River and tributaries.
