ENGINEER'S REPORT
ON FAIRVILLE ROAD
GIVEN COMMITTEE

D. H. Kinghorn Speaks of
Letter Written to For-
mer Premier

SAYS GOVT. LIABLE
FOR SUM OF \$62,000

Chairman Wants Justice
Done to Both Province
and County

FREDERICTON, April 9.—The Public Accounts Committee delivered into the Fairville road work transaction again this morning and disclosed a highly interesting trail of a letter that D. H. Kinghorn, present provincial road engineer, claims was written in Fredericton last September by B. M. Hill, former road engineer, at the request of former Premier Veniot, and forwarded to Bathurst for the Premier's signature, but which the former Premier, according to Mr. Kinghorn, declares he never received. This letter was dictated by Mr. Hill at the instigation of J. King Kelley, K. C., Secretary for Saint John County, and former Councillor John T. O'Brien and embodied the county's viewpoint with respect to the government's liability for this road work and a special trip was made to Fredericton by these two officials when it was found the former government was going out of power without any definite agreement to pay for certain portions of the work.

Mr. Kinghorn read his report declaring the cost to date had run into \$800,000 and more. The original contract two years ago called for an expenditure of \$28,000, he said, the work being done by the Maritime Construction Company, Ltd. Questioned by Mr. Taylor, who were the officers of the Maritime Construction Company, Mr. Kinghorn said they were Joseph O'Brien, Murray Long and Harry Tippet.

Continuing, Mr. Kinghorn said he had gone over the entire work and rechecked it thoroughly. His report showed that, based on agreements now in writing, the government was liable for an amount of about \$88,000, of which sum an amount of \$28,000 had been paid for the Simms retaining wall, leaving a balance of about \$60,000. In addition there was the approach to the bridge to be finished and the government's share could not be accurately estimated yet. Furthermore, interest charges were rising every day as the \$62,000 was not yet paid.

"This is worse and more of it," remarked Mr. Smith. The chairman added that it looked to him as though the Lancaster Highway Board, of which Councillor O'Brien then was chairman, had let the county in for a fine mess and he expressed surprise that the County Council should finance the work purely on verbal promises. The amount involved was a large one and he wanted to see justice done to both the province and county. He then appointed Mr. Taylor and Dr. Oulton to go into the matter thoroughly and submit a report.

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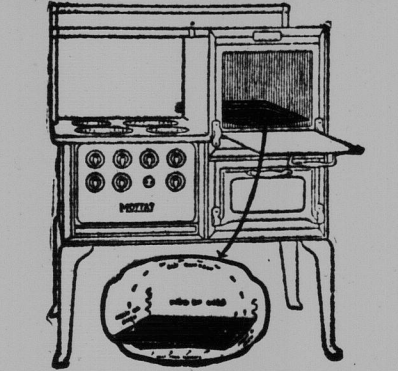
