LOCAL NEWS

W. S. Fisher, president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, left for New York and will sail for Jamaica, joining there the party of Canadian manufacturers who are to tour the West Indies to promote trading relations.

one year a local service worker in

connection with the General Public Hospital

and Miss Belle Howe was appointed

to that position. It was also recom-

mended that the Aid should establish a

clinic at the hospital if there was room.

The secretary's report was given by Mrs.

A. W. Estey. It was reported that the

membership was 1,046. The chief in-

terest of the Aid during the year had

been the furnishing of the Nurses' Home.

The report also told of how the hospi-

tal had been visited each week and of the

follow-up work which was done among

the needy and poor. The house com-

mittee report given by Mrs. Walter Mor-

ris told of what had been given to the

hospital. Mrs. Boyle Travers reported

for the visiting committee.

Ralph Robertson for the magazine com-

mittee. Reports were also given by the

denominational vice-presidents.

The furnishing committee's final report

told of the extra furnishing purchased for

the nurse's home after its opening and

members of the committee, Mrs. W. W.
