### Famous Stock Farm Sold.

New York, Nov. 6.—Word received here from Trenton, N. Y., that Mrs. L. A. Livingstone had sold the Ranocosa Stock Farm, located eighteen miles south of that city, which has been for about a half century the home of famous race horses and blue-blooded stock. The farm was bequeathed to Mrs. Livingstone by the late Pierre Lorillard, the

only American turfman to win the Epsom Derby with an American bred horse, Ironsides carrying his colors to victory in that world-famous race in 1881. The report did not say who was the purchaser nor what price was paid for the farm.

Bridgeport, Conn., Nov. 8.—Ralph Greenleaf, a professional billiard player, and George Worden, his manager, who were detained by Sergt. Frank Virelli of the state police, by order of Coroner Eli Mix of New Haven, yesterday were permitted to resume their tour. They were detained because the coroner might make inquiries of them in connection with the murder of Benjamin Binkovits, a Wall street messenger who disappeared in August with \$178,000 worth of bonds, and whose body was later found in Milford.
