### REPORT SAYS THAT JACK COOMBS IS ANXIOUS TO BECOME BASEBALL MAGNATE

Jack Coombs, who recently retired from baseball after a brief and very unsatisfactory stint as manager of the Philadelphia club may return to the game as a magnate. From the Quaker City comes a well founded report that he has \$100,000 of his own to invest in the National League club in that city, and that he may head a syndicate to buy the franchise under which William F. Baker is now operating.

"I don't know whether or not Jack has as much money as he claims to have," Baker is reported to have said, "but I am certain that if he has he would not risk it in a ball club. Jack is a careful person, and I think that all his talk about being willing to go into a syndicate to purchase this club was idle conversation."

The Phillies are not for sale. If any one comes along with \$750,000 he can buy the club but it is not on the market. The talk of dissatisfaction among the stockholders is all bunk, and even if it were not I control the club and will continue to do so for the next two years."

## WHAT QUEBEC OWES TO AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION

(Montreal Herald.)

This province is attaching as much importance to agricultural education these days as any other province of the Dominion. And the reason is that the results obtained from the activity along the lines of agricultural education in the past merit their extension in the future.

Since 1914 practical teaching of horticulture has been a feature of the teaching in primary schools in Quebec. It is estimated that in fourteen years no less than 61,538 pupils have been taught in the schools the rudiments of horticulture. They might only have been elementary principles, but those who have been watching the development say that this early training has aroused the natural curiosity of the school children, and left on their minds favorable impressions and ideas regarding the cultivation of the soil.

In Quebec housekeeping schools are located in different parts of the province. These schools carry out a programme of housekeeping adapted to the requirements of the people in their homes. Everybody testifies that these housekeeping schools are doing splendid work. In 1906 there were only two of these housekeeping schools, one located at Roberval and the other at St. Paschal. These schools received \$8,000 in grants. Today there are more than fifty housekeeping schools in Quebec, and their annual grant amounts to over \$20,000.

In Quebec agricultural experts are sent around the province to give the farmers in their homes the benefit of the latest improvements in agricultural production. These experts are called district agronomists, and their work is altogether apart from the work of the agricultural college. It is felt that the influence of the agricultural colleges is mainly felt among the young people, but the district agronomists, on the other hand, reach more than only among those too old to attend agricultural schools, but also among those who cannot afford leisure to be present at lectures or demonstrations. In Quebec no farmer has any excuse for not adopting the best means of culture, because under the policy of the minister of agriculture, Hon. Mr. Caron, agronomists are attached to different districts, and as they visit the farmers at their homes, they give

## WATERLOO HERO WAS HER FATHER

A correspondent writes to the London Times:

"A link with the past of the British army has been sounded by the death, at an advanced age, of the Hon. Lady Montgomery-Moore, the wife of a distinguished general, Sir Alexander Montgomery-Moore, who died only a few months ago. She was the last surviving daughter of John Colborne, afterwards Field Marshal Lord Eaton, whose brilliant charge of the French guards when in command of the 62nd is now generally recognized as having decided the Battle of Waterloo."

"It was beautiful to see the reverence which Lady Montgomery-Moore preserved to the last for the memory of her father. She inherited from him his whole-hearted admiration for Sir John Moore, to whom Colborne had been military secretary. She had known the Duke of Wellington well, and in more recent times, Lord Wolseley."

"Her mind remained to the last extraordinarily active, and she would always talk of new books. If her interest was most in the events of the Peninsula War, it extended also to many other sides of life. She must have left on all who knew her the impression of a deeply religious and reverential nature and of a singularly decided and stimulating mind."
