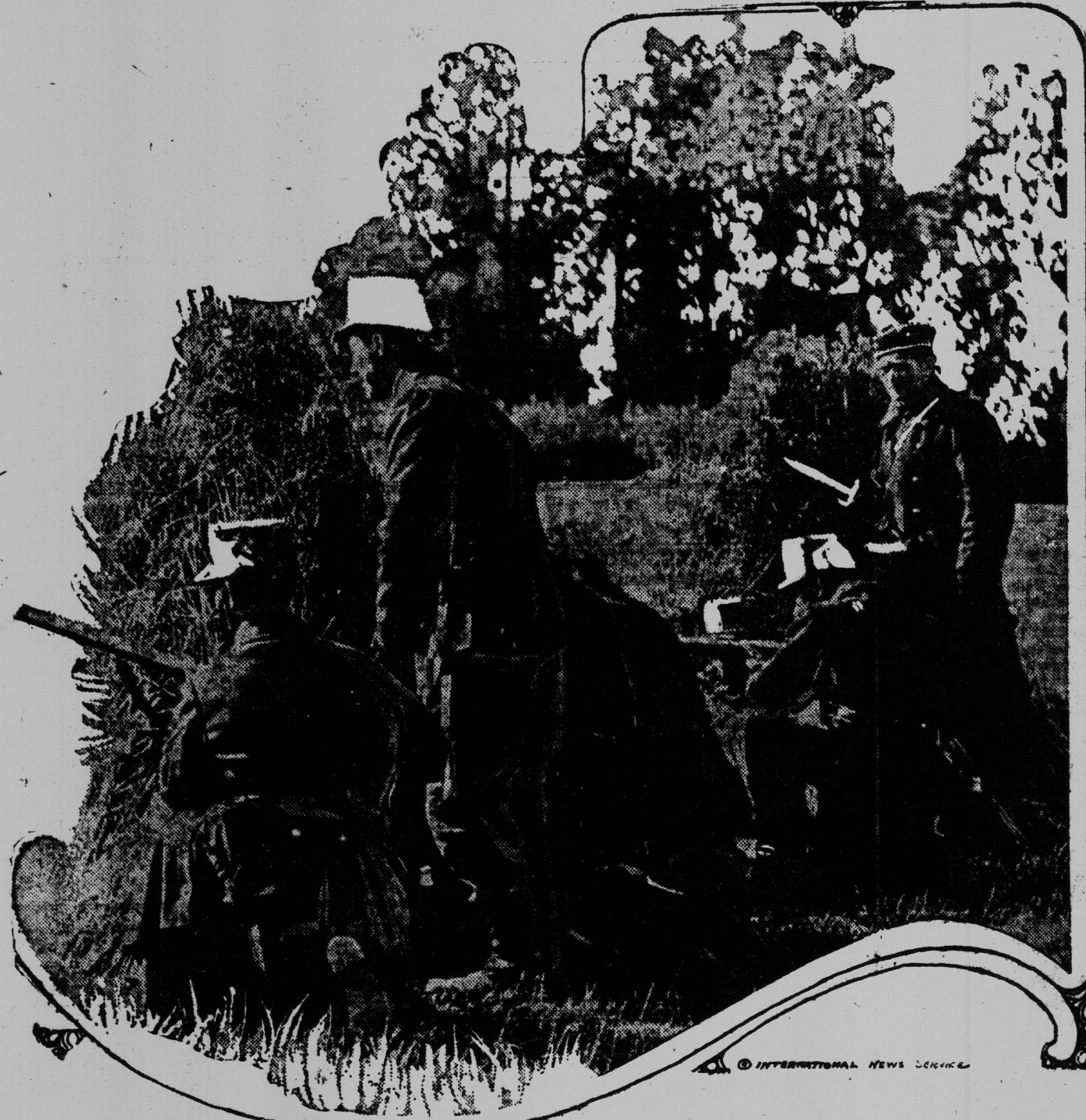

## SERIOUS SUSSEX FIRE

A loss of about \$15,000 was caused by fire at Sussex, N. B., early this morning, when the new brick block recently built by George W. Fowler, M. P., was badly gutted. He occupied the upper portion of the building, and lost much of his furniture. He and his wife were at their summer home in Rothsay when the fire broke out.

Others who lost by the fire were: A. Davidson, grocer, whose entire stock valued at \$2,500 was burned, and Black Bros., who lost their \$5,000 stock in hardware. Mr. Davidson has \$2,500 insurance, and Messrs. Black \$5,000, while the building, the damage to which was about \$5,000 was partly insured. Mr. Fowler's furniture loss was protected by \$1,500 insurance.

## SANDLOT TEAMS MEET TO DECIDE NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

(By Hugh S. Fullerton.)

September sees the opening of the greatest national amateur baseball tournament ever held.

The teams commence the great inter-city struggles that will decide which teams will represent the sections of the United States in the finals for the championship of the National Amateur Baseball Association.

The organization which last spring arranged for the amateur tournament, has widened its scope, and the success of this season indicates that next spring the National Amateur Association will embrace all portions of the country.

The season thus far has been an immense success, and with the growth of interest in amateur baseball all over the country, President E. C. Patterson and Secretary E. C. Seaton already are planning the extension of the league for next year.

Two divisions have been named for the series of this fall: one the Middle Western division, the other the Middle Eastern. The Middle Eastern comprises the St. Louis, Cleveland, Columbus and Toledo; the Middle Western, Chicago, Omaha, St. Paul and Louisville.

The National Amateur Association has grown strong this season. Starting from a chaotic condition it has attempted to codify the amateur rules, and to bring all representative amateur teams under its direction.

The task of organizing the entire country was found entirely too large for perfecting in one season, but the officials have worked hard to straighten out the situation.

There were dozens of minor questions in dispute, and during this winter the effort will be made to enter the work all over the country. Special effort is being made to secure the co-operation of the heads of play grounds leagues and similar organizations.

The National Amateur Association now is composed of Chicago, Cleveland, St. Paul, Denver, Louisville, St. Louis, Baltimore, Indianapolis, Cincinnati, Columbus, Milwaukee, Omaha, Washington, Johnstown, Pa., Pittsburgh, Lowell, Mass., Dayton, O., Gary, Ind., Philadelphia and Duluth.

The applications for membership are received constantly and the association promises to be next year to baseball what the A. A. U. is to other athletics.

The attendance upon Amateur Association games this season indicates a steady growth of interest in purely amateur baseball. The association is receiving into membership all athletes who are working for the extension of amateur sports in America.

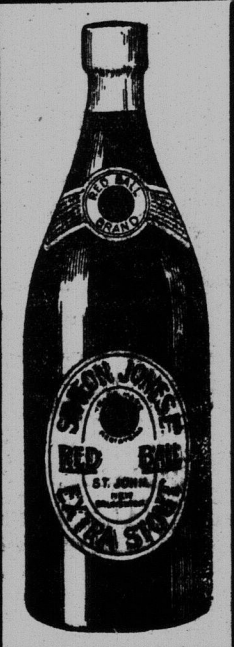
