MR. COPP REPLIES TO
ABUSE BY STANDARD

(Daily Telegraph.)

Saskville, N. B., Dec. 29.—When the at-
tention of A. B. Copp, M. P. F., was
called to the editorial in today's Stand-
ard, he said:
"I stated that the Standard seeks to
bolster up an admittedly weak cause by
quoting the late administration. I wish
to state that the Standard is not a
party organ of what the Tweddies or Pog-
ley government or any government did at
any time. The issue before the province
is whether, judging from the financial
statements which have just been issued, its
affairs are being wisely and honestly con-
ducted."
"That is the question to be discussed
and no amount of mud-slinging and ad-
ultery can blind the eyes of the people
of this province to the extravagant way
in which our business is being adminis-
tered."
"According to the Standard's own state-
ment there is a deficit of \$50,000, and
realizing the statement of its friends,
it seeks to apologize for the large deficit
and to suggest that there will be a certain
amount next year."
"Why does the Standard apologize if the
deficit is a proper thing for the province
to have?"
"I stated that judging from the history
of the past, the deficit would be larger
increased when all this year's bills were
paid, and I cited as an instance a bill for
about \$400,000 in 1909 for the largest
contract in the history of the province.
In 1910, two years after the commission
held investigation."
"If one bill is held over, surely there is
good reason to suspect other bills will be
similarly treated."
"The Standard claims that there is no
evidence to prove that the condition of
the provincial finances is alarming. That
is where the trouble is. The Fleming
government tries to cover up everything
they can, they give the people just as little
information as possible, and instead of
being able to show a statement to prove
of their apologetically admit an expenditure
of nearly \$400,000 more than the late gov-
ernment ever had to spend, and in addi-
tion are compelled to show a balance of
nearly \$90,000 the wrong side of the
ledger."

It would have been in the maritime prov-
inces, until recently, a safe bet that if an
immigrant were to ask a native to recom-
mend a section of Canada in which to live,
the reply would be, "Go West my man."
Don't stay here for your life. Get out and
go where the odds are in your favor. It
was not until the late war that the mar-
itime provinces began to attract the atten-
tion of the Dominion, and it was not until
the fact came here to assure us that we
were greatly favored by the war, that we
began to realize that we were not so much
a good one.

There are at hand many signs that a
better day is dawning on us and on our
maritime provinces. We can all help the
forward movement by doing our part. We
must have a good word for ourselves and
our surroundings. In future when a man
goes to settle in our province, there are good
opportunities here, just as good as he can
find anywhere else and if his decision as
to his domicile hinges on your recom-
mendation, there should not for a moment
be any doubt as to where he will reside.
He will be a New Brunswicker, and we
predict, if he makes good use of his talents,
a good one.
