SAY WOMAN ADMITS HOTEL BURGLARY
 Is Held in \$2,500 Bail for Stealing Pearl Necklace Which She Pawned for \$25.

New York, Dec. 18.—Burglaries in the Hotel Biltmore, Commodore and Waldorf-Astoria are alleged by the police to have been confessed by Mrs. Emily Armstrong, alias Lucile Foster, thirty-five, who was arrested on Tuesday night after endeavoring to pawn a pearl necklace valued at \$2,500.

When questioned at Police Headquarters the prisoner is said to have admitted stealing the necklace from Mrs. Speyer, whom she met in the hotel. She said that she had left the necklace in a rooming house, and that she had returned to the hotel to find it missing.

According to the police, the prisoner admitted that she had systematically committed burglaries in the hotels of Manhattan.

The hotels in which she is said to have operated were notified and some of them sent detectives to try to identify the prisoner. Detective Callahan of the Biltmore was unable to identify the woman, but he identified a halibut lost by a guest of that hotel two weeks ago. Similarly Detective Watson of the Hotel Commodore recovered two bags stolen from that hotel recently.

When she was arraigned before Magistrate Peter V. Frothingham in Jefferson Market Court she was held in \$2,500 bail for examination.

AVERAGE LENGTH OF LIFE 55 YEARS
 (Bulletin Detroit Tuberculosis Society)
 How long may a baby who begins life today in the United States hope to live? According to figures that have recently been announced by the Department of Commerce from Washington, D. C., a boy baby has an expectation of life at birth of 53.29-100 years. That is for all white males. It is the girl baby, however, that is lucky, for according to these figures, she may expect to live two more years than the boy. Of course, this does not mean that every baby that opens its eyes to life beyond that period is 54.29-100 years of age, but it does mean that a goodly number will not live beyond that age. What it does mean is that these are the average figures of the length of life for this country.

How long may a man hope to live who has reached the age of thirty-two? For him the average expectation of life beyond that period is 34.98-100 years, while every man who reaches the age of sixty-two has the expectation of living 19.08-100 years. In analyzing these figures, however, there is one fact that is not quite so cheerful. People are still dying far too rapidly in the adult periods of life.

THIEVES THREW LOOT INTO CAN
 Pair Tossed Away Author's Irreplaceable Plot Book and Her Fur Coat—One is Ex-Police Reserve.

New York, Dec. 18.—Earl W. Thorne of West 18th street and Robert Perry of East Thirty-ninth street, Manhattan, who were arrested by Detectives Wandling and Clauer in connection with the recent series of robberies in the Hollis, Jamaica, Richmond Hill and Kew Gardens, were arraigned before Magistrate Harry Miller in the Police Court and held without bail. They pleaded not guilty of burglary, but admitted their guilt of the theft.

After the arrests, according to the police, Thorne was taken to Manhattan. In his room were found many valuables, including a diamond necklace, a fur coat, and a pair of shoes. Thorne also told the detectives that a fur coat they had stolen from a house in Richmond Hill had been given to a girl, who, he said, was Perry's common law wife. The girl was found in the Bronx and the case was recorded. It was later identified as the property of Mrs. Louis Ogelinger, Richmond Hill.

Asked by Magistrate Miller if they were the men who robbed the home of his mother at 110 Clinton avenue, Manhattan, last summer, Perry replied: "No. We did not rob any homes until a month ago. We did rob a home at 102 Newbold Place, Kew Gardens, into an ash can and had also thrown away her fur coat, valued at \$300, because they were afraid to carry it. They also said they had put a stolen life insurance policy into a mail box, believing that it would be returned to the owner."

SUDAN PLANS EXTENSIVE IRRIGATION TO AID COTTON
 Cairo, Egypt, Nov. 15.—(By Mail)—Moved by the decrease in Egypt's production of cotton, the Sudan government will resume the irrigation development which came to an end in 1913 owing to financial reasons and labor troubles.

A contract for irrigation, to cost about \$10,000,000, has been taken by an English firm. It is expected that in three years' time 800,000 acres of cotton will be under cultivation, producing about 60,000 bales annually. Several thousand natives will find employment under Englishmen as foremen and directors.
